WEAPONS OF MANY WARS. Collection of Historical Firearms is Exhibited at the World's Fair.

ST. LOUIS, April 25 .- A great collection of firearms of every make and design, of all nations and of all ages, World's Fair. Every kind of weapon used in wars in bygone ages is shown in this quaint and curious collection. It is one of the exhibits of the departent of Forestry, Fish and Game. This collection contains weapons dating back to the bow gun, from which arrows and heavy stones were thrown, the propelling power being simply the elasticity of the wood, as in the American Indian bow. The various stages of the wide-mouthed blunderbuss are also shown, after which comes the more modern guns of the flint-lock, muzzle loading type, which were in use so many years before being supplanted by the cap and ball rifle and pistol which, in turn, gave way to the bree loading, rapid firing guns in use in the most advanced nations of the world today, as arms for troops and as fowling pieces for sportsmen. A number of cannon of various kinds are also shown in this collection.
