CHICAGO, Feb. 7. - Rapid fire guns nounted on automobile cars, are to be used by the Russians for the protection of the trans-Siberian Railway. Six of these cars have been ordered by Ni-cholas Summerfield, of Moscow, a re-presentative of the Russian government, who has visited the Chicago au-tomobile show. They were ordered for immediate delivery. The cars will be especially built with extended platforms in front and rear, to hold the guns, it being further specified that they are to be equipped with thirty norse-power motors of high speed.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The charge d'affaires of the Russian embassy informed the Associated Press this afternoon that there is no basis for the rumors of peace prospects. The Russian at-titude, he declared, had not changed. Peace could not be considered unde present conditions.
