

Mr. E. Melley Scovill and his brother, Mr. C. Lee Scovill, of New York city, arrived in St. John last Saturday to visit their grandmother, Mrs. W. E. Scovill. They will spend about three weeks as the guests of Senator Domville, Rothery, and Wm. E. Baxter of Norton.

A consultation between J. D. Hazen, president of the Horticultural Association and Chief of Police Clark was held yesterday in reference to the control of vehicles in the Park on Friday evening during the visit of His Excellency the Governor General and staff. All horses and vehicles will be excluded from the roads encircling the lake. Policemen will enforce the regulations.

The steamer Mic-Mac is reported ashore at Broad Cove near Cape Pine, Newfoundland, a short distance from Cape Lajoie. It will likely be a total loss.

The Mic-Mac sailed from this port last Saturday for Bow Head for a total loss. The vessel is reported to have 66,396 feet birch valued at more than \$25,000 and shipped by John E. Moore.

The vessel is now owned by J. W. Macmillan & Co., of New Glasgow, N. S., and is insured. Captain Fraser in command of the Mic-Mac is well known here and has the reputation of being a thorough and careful navigator.

The steamer was built at Glasgow in 1893. She is 160 tons net and 229 tons register, 20 feet long, 40.5 feet in breadth, 22.8 feet depth. The engines were 245 horse power. The vessel was built of steel. The passengers and crew of the vessel were not injured.

EVERYBODY WELCOME TO THE VICTORIA GROUNDS. New Playgrounds Were Opened Today and Promise to be a Grand Success.

The Victoria playgrounds are now in full swing and this morning were filled with delighted children, for whom all the known outdoor games had been provided.

The grounds are in charge of Miss Robertson and Miss Beattie, who were delighted at the spacious grounds. They considered the Victoria field incomparably superior to the copped up asphalt school yards which have so long vied the children with amusement during the summer.

The new playgrounds will be open every morning, afternoon and evening until the end of the school holidays. They will be open in the evenings for a considerable time after that.

Mothers are specially invited to visit the grounds, where there will be no limitations of space, and perambulators can be taken down for the children too young to walk.

The grass has been thoroughly run over with havis mowers and the grounds now present an ideal appearance. The older children and grown ups are invited to attend also and partake of the fun and enjoy the pleasure so manifest on the faces of those attending the grounds this morning.

MOTOR BOAT RACE AT WESTFIELD SATURDAY. The first race in the second series for motor boats for another cup, which is being awarded by the Toronto Junction Engine Co., will be sailed at Westfield on Saturday.

These races have been arranged because some of the participants in the first series were not satisfied with the results. Five entries have been received for the coming event, and as several of the boats have been thoroughly gone over and put in better shape, it is anticipated that the contest will be rather more exciting than the last.

The first race will be at 2:30 on Saturday, and will be twice around the lower half of No. 1. course. Harry Robinson will be the officer of the day. The other two races will take place on August 24th and 31st.

ARRESTED ON THE CHARGE OF STEALING A COAT. Samuel J. Chisholm, alias J. C. Brown, who has done time in Dorchester penitentiary, is once more a prisoner. The charge is for stealing. He served fifteen months in Dorchester for stealing a coat and was released about 1900.

This morning an Assyrian named George D. Mighis, with his father, arrived in the city and at the Union depot left his eight dollar raincoat with his valise in the station house. On his return his coat was missing and he communicated with the police. Policeman Senple got Chisholm on Main street and placed him in the central police station.

When the Assyrian accosted Chisholm on the street regarding the coat he said he purchased it from another person for \$1.50. The case will probably be heard tomorrow morning.

HE DID NOT ATTEND THE CORPORATION BAUQUET

Judge Willich, U. S. Consul, Left Before the Dinner Began—Much Talk Over His Action

St. John is today discussing the official standing of the United States consul at this port, and views are being expressed as to whether or not his position entitles him to especial distinction in formal gatherings.

The discussion arises from the fact that Judge Willich was not invited to the dinner tendered last evening to His Excellency Earl Grey. It was evident from the arrangement of seats that Judge Willich was not regarded by the civic committee as entitled to a place of exceptional honor, as he was allocated to a chair at one of the tables jutting out from that at which Earl Grey was seated.

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GET UP EARLY AND LOOK AT THE COMET

Have you seen the comet? People who are out late at night or early in the morning these days have a good chance to look at it.

Mr. Harrison states that it is to be found in the eastern sky and is visible at any time after three o'clock, not very high above the horizon. It is in the constellation of Gemini and the body is now about the size of a star of the second magnitude.

The tail, which to the naked eye looks like a mass of vapor, is quite distinct when glasses are used, and appears to be several degrees in length. The eastern sky in the early morning is pretty well crowded, but Mr. Harrison says that in spite of this the comet is easily discernible.
