GETS THIN ON THRASHING NO WALK TO TAMPA CHECK TO ORDER

Miss Dora Harrison Lost Pound a Day During 1,000 Mile Pilgrimage from New York to Florida.

Savannah, Ga., Feb. 23.—Accompanied by Mrs. Margaret Brown, a native of New York, but a winter resident of Savannah, Miss Dora Harrison, of Evergreen, L. I., who is walking on a wager and for the purpose of reducing her weight, left a few days ago for Tampa, Fla., on the last half of her extensive pilgrimage. The young woman, on the advice of Mrs. Brown, who is familiar with the roads in that section, will follow the tracks of the Seaboard Air Line Railway into Florida. The distance from Savannah to Tampa is 384 miles.
 Miss Harrison arrived in Savannah several days ahead of her schedule. She had covered the distance from New York, approximately 1,100 miles, in forty-three days. Starting at 175 pounds, she has lost nearly a pound a day during the trip, tipping the scales at about 140 pounds on the evening of her arrival. It was her intention to continue her trip after a day's rest in this city, but she stayed over in order to meet Mrs. Brown and give the latter time in which to make her preparations.
 "I first conceived the idea of making the Southern trip to prevent an increase in my weight," said Miss Harrison. "When I first mentioned the subject a girl friend immediately volunteered to accompany me. Another friend—a man—offered to waver \$1,000 that we would be unable to make the trip, immediately took him up on that proposition. My girl friend got cold feet as the time to make the start approached, and I was forced to make the journey alone. I think I will have no difficulty in earning the money."
 The trip from New York to Savannah was rather pleasant. I was fortunate enough to meet with good weather nearly all of the way. I followed the railroad tracks nearly all the way down. It was, however, lonesome.
 Miss Harrison says the \$1,000 she expects to win by making the trip will be due upon her arrival in Tampa and will be paid to her there. She will then buy a saddle horse. On the return trip to New York she will be accompanied by Mrs. Brown, who is also an equestrienne. Mrs. Brown is willing to walk the entire distance back to New York if Miss Harrison agrees.

INSURGENT SUFFRAGETTE

London, Feb. 23.—There is war in the camp of the militant suffragets. Mrs. Teresa Billington-Grieg is the insurgent leader. This good-looking suffragette was the initiator, five years ago, of the militant tactics. Before then she had been a prominent labor leader.
 She says the party is now an oligarchy, that Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst and her daughters have made themselves autocratic and that everything is now done for their personal glorification and profit.
 "The working women have been driven out," says Mrs. Grieg. "The party is now ready to stick a dagger in the aristocracy. To become one of the sacred circle you must either have money or a title. A narrow religious exclusiveness has been introduced, and those who do not conform are kicked out."
 "When the movement started the aim was to obtain votes for women on a basis of sex equality. That has now been narrowed down to votes for those with academic qualifications. And what militant operations there are, happen solely for the advertisement of the Pankhursts and their following. They are ready to stick a hatpin in a policeman's eye, but they never stop declaring they are perfect ladies. They may kick and lame an infirm cabinet minister, but they never forget their titled relationships."
 The Pankhursts, so Mrs. Grieg says, found an "angel" at the start in Mrs. Pankhurst Lawrence, who financed their operations. Since then the money has rolled in, and Mrs. Grieg says that the Pankhursts have done mightily well for themselves.
 Consequently, Mrs. Grieg, as the apostle of the most earnest militantism, has broken away to form a society of her own. She commands a large following, comprising the whole of the north of England, and Scotland. It is likely that she will shake the women's social and political union, as run by the Pankhursts, to its foundations.
