**Insects as Disease Carriers.**

## STREET RAILWAY COMPANY TO HAVE "PAY-AS-YOU-ENTER" CARS

Six New Ones to be Built at Once was Report Made to Annual Meeting of St. John Railway Company Yesterday—Company's Net Profits Last Year \$54,000.

The annual meeting of the St. John Railway Company shareholders was held yesterday afternoon in their offices. The report of the directors showed that the company had declared four quarterly dividends of one and one half per cent. The directors and officers were re-elected. No definite statement was made in reference to future extensions of the company's lines, and in reference to the company's attitude toward the new bridge at the Falls, it was stated that they had made a proposition to the government and expected an answer in a few days.

The report of the directors was as follows: "Your directors have much pleasure in submitting a statement of the year's business, showing a net profit, after providing for the interest on the bonds and all other purposes of \$54,232.41, out of which your directors have declared four quarterly dividends of one and one half per cent. amounting to \$48,000, leaving a balance of \$6,232.41, which has been transferred to profit and loss account. The accrued dividend of 1 per cent. for November and December, 1910, was included in the first quarterly dividend paid April 1st.

"During the year the following works have been undertaken: "New brick and steel car barn on Wentworth street, 55x212 feet. In connection therewith we purchased the Fisher and Cather's lots adjoining. "Brick and steel office and supply building on Nelson street, 28x41 feet. "We purchased during the year a lot of land owned by the Lantulum estate on which part of our power house is situated. A large amount has been expended for repairs and improvements on the railway and light system, the physical condition of which has been well maintained. It is proposed to remove the railway tracks from Brittain street between Wentworth and Charlotte streets, and place them on Broad street. It will also be necessary to provide additional cars and we propose to have built at once six new pay as you enter combination cars.

"At the last session of the legislature authority was given to the company to construct and operate lines for the transmission of electric current for light, heat and power throughout the county of Kings, and power was also granted to develop and operate waterpowers in said county. Your directors propose to extend the electric light service during the present year to Rothessay, Milford and Crouville. "We have also acquired all the property, franchises and privileges granted to the Carleton Electric Light and Power Company.

## MORMONS ARRIVE ON STEAMER TUNISIAN

Allan Liner Arriving Yesterday Had Several Elders and Many Converts and Passengers from England.

The Allan liner Tunisian, Captain Fairfull, arrived in port yesterday afternoon from Liverpool via Halifax and docked at pier number 6, Sand Point. Ideal weather prevailed during the first part of the voyage, although the steamer met with a great deal of drift ice which forced her to take a more southerly course, this, together with the fact that she ran into a heavy easterly gale during the latter part of the passage, caused the liner to be one day late in arriving at Halifax. While forging through this gale about 70 miles east of Halifax the Tunisian passed the Empress of Ireland and by the use of signals all was reported well on both ships.

The vessel brought over, besides a large general cargo, 654 passengers among whom were 31 saloon, 273 second, and 350 steerage. Prominent among the passengers were several Mormon elders together with their converts, of whom there were a large number. These people are all bound for Western Canada and the United States. The Tunisian lately has been carrying a large number of Mormons of many things, but likely the chief thing will be the curtains and draperies. If she is wise she will come to F. A. ## LITTLE GIRL ATTACKED BY VICIOUS DOG AND CAT

Young Daughter of William Swanton had Thrilling Experience in South End Butcher Store.

Yesterday afternoon at 6 o'clock Wm. Swanton's three year old daughter, Audrey, and a sister were sent to Michael J. McGivern's store on the corner of St. James and Sydney streets, to purchase some meat. When they entered the store a collie dog owned by McGivern jumped on the little girl and fastening its teeth in the child's cheek knocked the child down on the store floor. While the dog was biting at the child's face a cat which was in the store jumped on the little girl's head and began to claw her. Mr. McGivern was not in the store at the time, but a girl clerk who was present rushed to the rescue and after beating the dog and cat away she lifted the injured child up on the counter. The dog again tried to get at the little girl but was beaten off. The little Swanton girl's face and head was badly scratched and bleeding and the dog's teeth had pierced her cheek. Dr. McAulay was summoned and dressed the child's wounds. Last night at 9 o'clock Acting Sgt. Ross called on Mr. McGivern, the owner of the dog and on the latter's request, the officer killed the dog with a shot from his revolver. The owner of the dog cannot account for his vicious actions as it was about the store nearly all the afternoon and was very quiet, and was never known to have bitten any person before. The child had hardly entered the store before the dog sunk its teeth in her cheek.

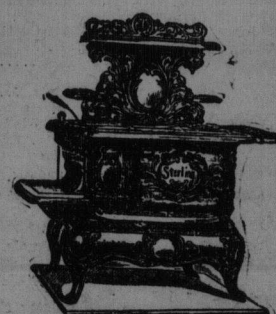
