The valedictory was the key note of the valedictory, which was as follows:

It is said that the thoughts of youth are long, long thoughts. They reach far into the future and create dreams of happiness of mature life. But, alas! the youth of the world is self, and uncomprehensive of life. It is willing to fit along, unimproved, into the future, and to leave the world behind, wealth, within itself, powers to accomplish higher things, and perceives its privilege of a great, great, great goal. It awakes the youth to the consciousness of its faculties, to impregnate it with the desire of knowledge, to give it the sense of life's meaning and the purposes of life, to give it definiteness of purpose and concentration of power, is to require, while opportunity yet fills every moment, the requisites to win the high-

to those who wait, and work, and hope. The completion of the years of college life which you, fellow students, regard as the most precious time of your life, has many of our distinguished visitors recall with pleasing reminiscence, is to be remembered by you, too, in the year nineteen thirteen. Those ruthless years of preparation, which are for some a past regret, for others a source of pride, are for you actually full of hope, present for consideration their influence upon the mind and upon life. The years of preparation are the mind for the reception of truth. The ideas and notions, which we constantly receive from the world, from the press, and their import appears, not from themselves alone, but from their relations to other truths and principles. The years of preparation are the relations of truths through the basic principles of the different orders of creation, from the material to the spiritual, perceiving the evils and abuses of social conditions, attempt to establish a new order, to remove the evils, and only the injustice suffered by certain classes, and ignorant of the nature and purposes of society, some of these changes in the social order. The innovators, having no true criterion of right and wrong, and not knowing that their reforms might be fundamentally unsound and creative of worse conditions. Striving for the improvement of the world, they can accomplish much for the betterment of life, waste

their sincere, misdirected efforts to bring about a more equitable distribution of property through ignorance of the relations and purposes of the various elements of the industrial system, and that correct abuses, establish justice and bring property properly from the possession of the true relation between the individual and the community, the nature of society, or from the comprehension of inter-related ideas.

It is the duty of the philosopher to conform to general economic laws, obtain industrial prosperity. Masters of industry, consciously or implicitly, must follow the same laws. To judge the value of various propositions as the basic and governing principles of the industrial system, and to determine if those principles is in continual danger of ruin. Industrial progress, therefore, requires that by fundamental laws the understanding and the significance of industrial elements must be understood. In finance, also, knowledge of the laws of the system and the ignorance of them means ruin. The Duke of Orleans, unconscious of the connection between sound currency and the soundness of the industrial system, the finances of France and precipitated the revolution. The liberal arts, as manifested by the sciences of physics, moral and metaphysical science, the first principles of our ideas, show the meaning of facts and impressions, and the laws of the universe, and that is prepare the mind to receive truth.

TO ERECT HATCHERY FOR
TROUT NEAR THE CITY

**Hon. Mr. Hazen has Arranged
to have it Built near Little
River Dam — Great Aid to
Fishermen.**

Fishermen in St. John and throughout the province will be glad to know that the Hon. J. H. Munroe, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, is arranging to locate a trout hatchery near this city. The Minister is now in St. John representing the Forest, Fish and Game Association, waited on Hon. Mr. Hazen and suggested that the Government should purchase a tract of land along the lakes and streams stocked with game fish. A site on Loch Lomond was suggested. The Minister has been making his way clear to accept the suggestion; then made, but later sent here a letter to the effect that the Government, with instructions to select the best available site in the vicinity of St. John, had concluded to purchase the property, including the city property near the Little River dam. This was considered particularly desirable, and negotiations with the city and the negotiations were opened with the city.

Since his arrival here this week Hon. Mr. Hazen has concluded the agreement. It was agreed at a conference with Commissioner Wigmore that the government should purchase

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
