SOUTHAMPTON RAILWAY INQUIRY IS BEGUN

Opened yesterday by R. A. Pringle, Commissioner, and will be resumed July 7th.

Fredericton, May 12.—The investigation into the cost of the Southampton Railway, which has been ordered by Dominion government, will be resumed here on Tuesday, July 7th. R. A. Pringle, K. C., of Ottawa, the Commissioner appointed to conduct the inquiry, held the first session of his court this morning for organization purposes, and after an order had been made for the production of the documents required, adjournment was made until the above date.

Mr. Pringle declared it to be his intention to have evidence produced on each of the thirty-five items contained in the report which was made by E. V. Johnson, the inspecting engineer, who has since been suspended by the Department of Railways, and the inquiry will be of the most thorough character throughout. T. J. Carter, K. In opening the inquiry Mr. Pringle said that it was brought about as a result of a speech made in Parliament on March 9th by Mr. P. B. Carvell, M. P., during the course of which he said that "a great wrong had been done," and which was followed by a speech by Hon. R. P. McLeod, M. P., which substantiated to some extent the statements made by Mr. Carvell, and included a statement to the effect that there were padded items in the accounts. Mr. Pringle then went on to make comparisons of the cost of the road as shown by Mr. Johnson's report and as brought out in evidence taken in the case of Stewart v. the Southampton Railway Company, referring to the many discrepancies.

LARGEST MOTOR BOAT EVER LAUNCHED ON THE NORTH SHORE

Built at Douglastown for Miramichi Lumber Company—Is forty-eight feet long.

Newcastle, May 12.—Councillor H. H. Lamont launched this morning from his shipbuilding yard in Douglastown the largest motor boat ever built on this river. It is for the Miramichi Lumber Co. and is forty-eight feet long, ten one-half feet beam and has two cabins, is handsomely finished and will be driven by kerosene oil.

The new town assessment is about completed. Very little reduction has been made in the rate of taxation which is 2.70 per cent. within the police and fire district and 3.10 outside. Last year the taxable value was \$921,000. There are this year 544 polls of which fourteen are for schools only, while the polls last year numbered 521, of which sixteen were for schools only. The assessors this year are Geo. McWilliam, J. H. Pinney and Chas. E. Fisher.
