NORWAY MEANS BUSINESS **UNLESS EXPLANATION IS** FORTHCOMING SOON

Copenhagen, Feb. 24; via London—Public opinion in Norway is greatly disturbed over the torpedoing in the English Channel off Dover of the Norwegian steamer Regin, presumably by a German submarine, according to an article appearing today in the newspaper Politiken, and as soon as a report covering the diaaster is received it will demand that the Norwegian government send to Germany a communication, the meaning of which it will be impossible to mistake. It has been intimated, the paper says, that all exports from Nor-way to Germany will cease until a satisfactory explanation is forthcom-ing, one which will outline the course that Germany propose to follow with regard to Norwegian shipping.
