Hundred New
Y.W.C.A. Members

Excellent Reports Were Received at the Regular Meeting Held Yesterday.

Over one hundred new members were reported by the members of the Y.W.C.A. at the regular meeting of the Y.W.C.A. held yesterday afternoon. Mrs. John McAvoy presided and the devotional exercises were led by Miss Tapscott.

Physical Department.

Mrs. Weyman, in her report on the physical department, told of a great deal of work done during the month. The instruction by Miss Littlefield of 430 girls, a number of basketball games played, and the formation of a basketball Junior League of fourteen teams. A decided stand has been taken for clean sports, much like basketball, and for rules suited to the physique of girls and women. It was decided to adopt boys' rules, with recognition of boundary lines, making it a less strenuous game than without lines. A gymnasium club has been formed. An excellent feature of the work is the physical examination which Dr. Macfarlane is giving. Each girl will have two, one to determine her needs or limitations, the other at the end of the year, to show improvement. Much gratitude is expressed to Dr. Parks for this service, and to Miss Perry who has assisted in the keeping of records.

Mrs. Z. Cowan gave the membership showing an increasing number of regular and sustaining members.

The cafeteria report showed that the King Street Home has been full. Meals served 4,861, of which 1,664 were to the public. Dr. Macfarlane is giving a course in dietetics to the staff and girls. Miss Sellers is warmly welcomed back as cafeteria director.

Travellers' Aid.

Figures from the Travellers' Aid report are as follows:—Trains met 296; boats, 25; taken to transient home, 132; helped at station, 122; taken to boats, 4; taken to hotels, 29; employment found for, 5; telegrams sent, 17. Miss Ford and her assistant, Miss Kirke, have been able to give assistance in many pitiful and difficult cases, and it is doubtful if these travellers could have gone on their way unless such judicious care had been available.

Mothers' Pensions and minimum Wage Act for Women were endorsed according to resolutions sent in by the N. B. Federation of Labor.

Miss Tapscott gave a detailed account of the National Council meeting which she attended recently. It was decided to hold a rummage sale early in April.

INTERESTS OF GRENFELL MIS-

Dr. H. L. Padden is expected to arrive in St. John at noon today, and this evening will address a public meeting in the interests of the Grenfell Mission. Dr. Padden has been at St. Stephen and Fredericton. At St. Stephen he formed a committee who will work for the Labrador Mission, and at Fredericton he put the cause of the mission before a number of citizens.

HOSPITAL FINANCE COMMITTEE.

A meeting of the finance committee of the General Public Hospital was held yesterday afternoon to consider the matter of providing a suite at the Nurses' Home for the Victorian. The question of expense was thoroughly looked into, but no decision was arrived at.

AT SEAMEN'S INSTITUTE

Four men who have spent some time at the Seamen's Institute were able to ship on board the "Odra" bound for Australia. The Institute is still crowded and the men are being housed in the hall.
