

BLACKJACKED WOMAN; HAIR SAVED LIFE

Man of 25 Fells Mrs. May
Meyers in Her 42d. St.
Apartment.

SCARED BY SCREAMS FLEES, CRYING FIRE

Robber Deals Four Heavy
Blows — His Victim is
Found Unconscious.

New York, June 17.—Mrs. May Meyers, 34 years old, fought for her life yesterday afternoon in her home, in West Forty-second street near Eighth avenue, when a young man pushed his way in with a question as to whether a "Miss O'Byrne" ever lived there, and then struck her on the top of the head with a blackjack. Mrs. Meyers has blonde hair, and lots of it. To that circumstance, Patrolman Joseph McKay believes, she owes her life.

"The chap sure meant to murder her," he said. "He wanted her jewelry, and a killing if she fought."

One of the blows struck Mrs. Meyers on the arm, and it swelled to twice its normal size.

Hair Killed Force.
The other blows landed on her head, and the mass of hair checked the terrible force.

The house overlooks one of the busiest traffic corners in the city. Mrs. Meyers went out for groceries for dinner. It is believed the man followed her. She wore some jewelry. The attack took place about an hour before her husband returned. Mrs. Meyers hardly had entered her apartment when there came a knock, and she saw a man about 35 years old, who held a straw hat behind him. He was polite, but insistent, and when Mrs. Meyers said she never had heard of a "Miss O'Byrne," he stepped forward suddenly and struck her.

Scared by screams.
Mrs. Meyers fell backward into the room, but got up again and fled. Her assailant struck four heavy blows in all, but it was one on the arm that caused her to drop to the floor. Her screams had proved effective, however, and the man fled. Tenants rushed out and asked him what was the matter.

"Only a little fire," he replied. "It's all right now." Then he ran out and disappeared.

Police found the tenants hurrying to get out their belongings. None had been to find out what was the trouble in Mrs. Meyers' apartment. Mrs. Meyers was found unconscious. Nothing in her apartment had been taken.

Sinn Feiners Burn Railway Signal Boxes

Man Shot and Wounded on
the Great Eastern Rail-
way.

London, June 17.—A campaign of widespread cutting of railway and signal wires and burning of signal cabins around London, attended by violence against signal men, was carried out during last night by "Sinn Feiners" and members of the Irish Self-Determination League. Nine men were arrested.

The official police statement says: "All the men arrested gave local addresses. They are young Irishmen between 17 and 22. It has been known for some time that the heads of the Irish Self-Determination League in London have been in correspondence with the so-called Irish Republican army, which has been directing the murders and outrages in Ireland."

Several railway signal boxes around London were burned last night by parties of men, alleged to be Sinn Feiners, who sprinkled oil over the boxes before lighting them.

At Acton, Uxbridge, Wembley, Bromley and other stations boxes were destroyed, but railroad men prevented similar action at Southall, where a signal man had been overpowered and bound by an attacking party.

At Bantley station, several men held up a signal man at the point of revolvers and bound him before destroying the signal box.

A signal man at Clapton Junction, an important point on the Great Eastern Railway, was shot and wounded, but he set the signals at "danger" and telephoned for assistance.

Scotland Yard officials were out all night making efforts to trace the miscreants, who are reported to have escaped.

JAIL SEVEN FOR SLAYING NEGRO

From Two to Eleven Years'
Sentence Imposed in Port-
land Schooner Tragedy.

Portland, Me., June 17.—Seven men indicted for the murder of James Walker, negro seaman, on the schooner Mary F. Barrett, in the harbor here on May 21, pleaded guilty to manslaughter today. They were sentenced to the State Prison for terms ranging from two to eleven years.

Walker and other members of the crew were beaten by alleged marine strike sympathizers who had boarded the schooner, and Walker was thrown overboard.

Sent All From Town
As a result of the attack, the Chief of Police, on orders from the mayor, ordered all out-of-town marine strike agitators to leave the city.

Two of the men sentenced today are connected with marine labor unions. Antonio Andrade, agent of the Marine Firemen's Union, Portland, was sentenced to two to three years. Nellie P. Clavien, agent of the Sailors' Union, Portland, was given a four to six year term.

THREE NEW CARDINALS

Rome, June 15.—Three Italian cardinals were added to the Sacred College today when Pope Benedict, in a secret consistory, raised to the purple Monsignor Giovanni Tacci Porcelli, the papal major domo, Monsignor Camillo Laurenti, secretary of the congregation of the propaganda, and Monsignor Achille Ratti, papal nuncio to Poland.

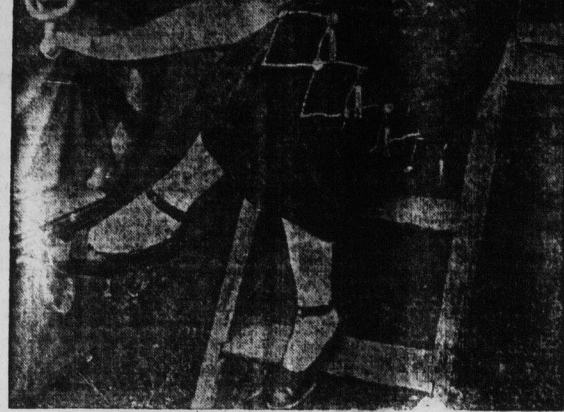
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Seek To Recover A Carload of Liquor

Hold Magistrate Responsible At Sydney

Sydney, N. S., June 17.—Judge L. N. McDonald, representing the attorney general's department of Nova Scotia, this afternoon notified Magistrate Alexander Campbell that he will be held strictly responsible for the carload of liquor removed from the city warehouse Wednesday afternoon under a search warrant issued in Magistrate Campbell's court. Judge McDonald is conducting a thorough inquiry into the circumstances surrounding the issue of the warrant and also of the summons for those served upon Temperance Act Inspector George R. Rideout, who seized the liquor last April, under the Nova Scotia Temperance Act.

FOUR MONTHS FOR THEFT

Bathurst, June 17.—Before Judge McLaughlin, in the court house, yesterday two young lads named Leo Lavigne and "Sandy" Dick were each sentenced to serve four months in the common jail for stealing bicycles from the premises occupied by the Rev. G. A. Ross, of Bathurst.

Both boys pleaded guilty to the charge and Judge McLaughlin passed sentence as stated above.

RAIN HELPED CROPS IN GAG TOWN DISTRICT

Ferry Between Gagetown
Lower Jemseg Is Now
Operation.

FISHING SEASON
WAS A POOR C

Road Work Now Under
in That Section of
Country.

Gagetown, N. B., June 17.—G. Currier, of Upper Gagetown, who already had considerable experience in road work, has been appointed local road commissioner, and has a road machine and five teams of horses at work on some of the back of the town during the week. Many of the ratepayers hoping that the sidewalks, whose condition "beggars description," will receive a little more attention usual this year.

Appreciate Ferry.
The new Government-run ferry between Gagetown wharf and L. Jemseg wharf has begun operation and is in charge of Fred C. N. and son Paul B. Nevers. The ferry service consists of a covered motor for passengers and a large scow for cars and carriages. It is scheduled to meet the morning and evening press trains, while passenger cars ferried at other time pass special rate.

Rains Helped Crops.
The recent rains have proved salvation of many of the crops, which looked last week as if they would not survive many more days of drought. In some cases, grain is up, and then shrivelled to ground; in Summerhill, there is little or no hay cut this year, and the garden seeds planted have come up. A very heavy downpour in the night at Upper Gagetown, which has been literally burned out, has great help to crops there, which usually of very good quality.

Poor Fishing Season.
Although the fishing season had been extended, local fishermen are not making much effort to secure them this week, owing to the drop in price. Several thousand pounds of chad were shipped here this spring to the Boston market. Wm. C. Belyea and Wm. Crawford being the most successful fishermen. Fred R. Pierce has met with good luck fishing salmon but salmon do not seem to be as plentiful as formerly.
