### Care of Teeth in Fruit Season.

Now that we are in the midst of the ruit season, it is well to remember that berries or clusters from vine and fruit trees, there is an element of destruction to the teeth. The grape fruit may be mentioned here—though not belonging to the list of summer fruits—as having an especin by acid action upon the teeth. Strange to say the huckleberry, which from the discoloration it makes would seem to have a most vicious effect upon the ivories, is not so much to be feared in effect as the innocent looking strawberry. The acid currant is to be mentioned as a fruit which it is well to put on the list of those which unless care is taken to prevent it, will harm the enamel. Sour grapes, so often found figuring on the pages of fiction, will be found in real life to belong to this class of suspects, prepared to mar the enamel of a set of fine and well cared for teeth. ### How to Fold Your Skirt.
