


MILLTOWN BABE **KILLED BY HORSE**

BALE IN NEW YORK MARKET

Pool Lost Half a Million to a Million in Day's Operations---Chief Decline in October Option, But Others Dragged Down.

New York, Aug. 20.-Excitement pre-vailed in the cotton market today through out the session, an almost uninterrupted and rapid decline in prices being the cause. The fall was most pronounced in the October option, that having been the principal vehicle for the recent big spec-ulation for the advance, but the option of other months suffered badly also, even the spot article, which had bee affected previously by the downward tendency of this week, yielding very sharply at last today.
