

REPORT.

THE Love of God has given existence to Christian Missions. Such Missions are needed, by the darkness, depravity, and degradation of fallen man. That love alone has inspired a volume for his illumination, comfort, and guidance; raised up, qualified, and authorised men to exhibit its doctrines and enforce its precepts; originated a wise and vast economy of means, to extend the tidings and truths of Redemption; and poured a Spirit from on high, whose office is, and whose energies are exerted, to teach and save mankind, by the instrumentality of those doctrines, precepts, and means. Well might the Rev. Richard Watson, at the commencement of one of his admirable Missionary speeches, say of this subject, "It is wide as the mercy of God and the wants of man."

THE COMMITTEE OF THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA, believing that this remark is as scriptural as it is emphatic, have endeavoured, during the past year, to act under the authority, and give a wider spread to the blessings, of that Volume which is stamped with mercy for the world; and now have the pleasure of presenting their *Eighteenth* Annual Report, which will show their endeavours have not been unsuccessful. Many are the Ministers, School Teachers, and Native Labourers they have had employed, who have been much aided and encouraged by the visits and services of the respected Missionary Agent, the Rev.
