TWENTY-NINE NAMES ADDED TO LONDON VOTING LIST BY **COURT OF REVISION TODAY**

Hordes of Anxious Voters Swoop Down On Officials, Anxious To Know If Their Names Are On List — Evening Sessions Not At All Probable.

Although the courts of revision appointed in the four different wards to revise the voters' list in preparation for the temperance referendum did not open until 10 o'clock this morning, 29 names had been added to the lists before noon. It is fully expected that the six-day session of the courts in this city will swell the voters' list by several hundred names.

The number of successful applicants by no means indicate the number of anxious voters who appeared before each of the courts to insure that they would be given a vote. In some of the wards at least two-thirds of the inquirers discovered that their names were already on the list.

According to one of the officials in charge these inquiries caused considerable additional work for the revising officers. It was the duty of the officer in charge, he said, to decide whether a person was eligible for a vote, to administer the oath and to see that the name was put on the list, but not to see whether the person's name was on the list. Halle, Germany, March 28.-Federal artillery was taking a prominent part today in dealing with the insurgent Communists in the disturbed section of Prussian Saxony. The artillery shelled the Communists, who were grouped on the hills to the west of Eisleben, dispersing them.

After a brief engagement, the town of Sangerhausen, southwest of Eisleben, was occupied by federal forces, which now control that place. Count Poninski, colonel of police in the Mansfield district, has taken charge of the operations around Eisleben.

DEAD MAN IS FOUND IN BURIAL VAULT UNDER CHICAGO SIDEWALK

Chicago, March 28.-The midnight visit of a well-dressed woman to a sidewalk crypt resulted in the discovery early today of the body of an dentified man who had been dead about two months. In his hand he While Walter Jonas, a watchman at a factory on the northwest

side of the city, was making his rounds at midnight, he saw a woman approach the sidewalk that adjoins a vacant lot, and which is elevated about ten feet above the lot. The woman stooped, scraped away a quantity of cinders and stones from the embankment and crawled under the sidewalk.

When she disappeared, Jonas sought a policeman and returned to the hole. The policeman found the man's body. The woman had departed. The police are searching for her.

The head of the body rested upon a parcel of men's apparel wrapped in the paper of a fashionable store on Michigan avenue. Doctors say the man had been dead about two months and was 35 years of age.
