COUNCIL WILL ENDEAVOR TO STRAIGHTEN OUT CITY GAS AND STREET RY. TANGLES

Special Meeting Called For Tuesday Noon At Request of Seven Aldermen—Draw Up Official Statement of Council's Attitude Toward Companies.

At the request of seven aldermen a special meeting of the city council has been called for noon Tuesday to discuss gas and street railway matters. This is the first time in many years that this rule of procedure has been invoked. Usually the mayor calls any special meetings which he considers necessary, but a majority of the aldermen may request him to call a meeting for any purpose which they may desire.

It is understood that the meeting will endeavor to draw up an official statement of the council's attitude toward the city gas and street railway companies. The statement will be presented to the Legislature on Monday.

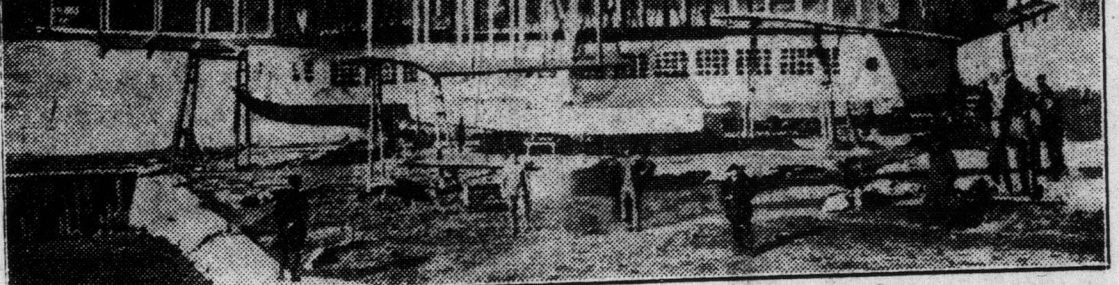

1,600,000 ELIGIBLE TO VOTE ON REFERENDUM

Revision of Lists Throughout Province Begins Today—800,000 Women Are Entitled To Vote On Question of Importation of Liquor Into Province—Polling Day On April 18.

Toronto, March 28.—If every eligible voter in Ontario exercises his or her franchise at the coming referendum, voting on which takes place three weeks from today, April 18—approximately 1,600,000 votes will be cast.

Falling on a Monday, the referendum should put an end to the long controversy as to whether women are sufficiently interested in the ballot to forsake their household duties. On this will rest the proportion of the approximately 800,000 women entitled to vote who will mark their ballot. Whether the householders will forgo the proverbial "wash day" to go to the polls to "clean up" the state of either side of the two factions remains to be seen.

CONTINUE SEARCH FOR BALLOON

Although still holding to the belief that the five men have been picked up by some fishing vessel, officials planned to continue the search unrelentingly.
