## Sanctum Suggestions.

At the recent exhibition held in Windsor, in the forty-eight sections of class A. (apples) Kings county took thirty-four first prizes, thirty-five second, twenty-eight third and twenty-three fourth prizes, or 120 out of the 192 offered. In class B, with forty-one sections of pears and plums, Kings county took in pears thirteen firsts, thirteen seconds, and in plums fifteen firsts, fourteen seconds and seven third—or 76 out of the 123 offered.

Hamilton Fyfe, published in the October number, in which occurred a paragraph from a late issue of the Calgary Eye Opener. While Sir Frederick's constituents will wonder that the action was not taken against the Eye Opener itself, as well as other Canadian papers which republished its article, it is at least gratifying to know that our representative is setting out at last to have his good name vindicated.

## Hallowe'en.

Without doubt, Hallowe'en has become a relic of Pagan times, but of how or when this festival preceding All Hallow's or All Saints Day originated there is no authentic account. The pre-eminence of the word on this day as on no other supernatural influences were all powerful over the lives and actions of the people. On this particular night spirits were supposed to walk the earth. Satan and his satellites, the witches mounted on the back of a large black cat or astride a broomstick were believed to hold their revels. Believing in the nearness of the unseen powers, Hallowe'en was regarded as a special season for inquiring into the future. While in England and Ireland this festival was observed with many curious rites and ceremonies it was among the Scotch that we have nearly all the revels in which the young people, even to the present day, indulge. The harmless observances usually take the form of a test or charm to determine who shall be the future partner. In this age of enlightenment when no one believes in witches there is yet much enjoyment in carrying out the old rites and ceremonies.

## November Canadian Magazine.

In The Canadian Magazine for November, Capt. H. S. Scott Harden replies to the articles that Saint N. Sing has written regarding British rule in India. Captain Scott Harden gets right down to the subject, and without theorising or philosophising, shows what Great Britain has done for India during the last fifty years. David Fanning, by Judge Savary, and the first of what promises to be a delightful series on French-Canadian folklore, by Dr. Louis Frechette.

## Harnessing the Tides.

At the recent provincial exhibition one of the most interesting displays was that made in machinery hall by the Cove Hydro-Electric company. It was a model of the system by which it is proposed to develop 7,500 horse power by utilizing the Bay of Fundy tide in the Tantramar river. A miniature dynamo at the exhibition was run by an electrical current developing by the water in the plant. The cost of producing power by this system, after construction of the plant, would be practically nil. As pointed out by a writer quoted in the Electrical Review, the method contemplated consists in creating two reservoirs or basins which communicate with the sea by means of control valves. One of these basins is filled at low tide, and the other emptied at low tide. The water is allowed to flow from one to the other, driving turbines connected to generators. A study of the tides has shown that in this way an almost continuous power can be depended upon. Besides the proposed plant on the Tantramar river, three important installations of this kind are now being considered in England. One of these is at Chester, where the estuary may be easily divided into two basins approximated equal in area. It is estimated that under ordinary tides about 6,800 horse power may be obtained, and under unusually high tides, 13,800 horse power, for ten hours a day. At Menai Strait a dividing dam would make available a considerable hydraulic power, because of difference in the time for tides at the two ends of the strait. The difference in height at times is as much as twenty-two feet, and the average is about sixteen feet at high tide. At Bristol it is contemplated creating two reservoirs, which will make available a maximum fall of thirty feet and a minimum of seventeen feet. There would be an average fall of nearly twenty feet for twenty-eight hours, and the power available for average tides would be over 500,000 horse power. The author then points out that the coast of France offers a number of sites where this method could be utilized with advantage. This would be particularly true to the coast of Brittany and Normandy, where the difference in the tides is about forty feet.

The following is a copy of a letter received by Mr. Cove from the Trump Manufacturing company, hydraulic and steam engineers:

"With the number of feet tide that you have, you can develop easily the power that you propose, and with the arrangement as shown on diagram which you send us, you can maintain almost continuous power, and at the same time can maintain a respectable head on your turbine. We consider your plan perfectly feasible and is all right, and if you can get market for the power that you develop, one. There is one thing certain, and that is you will not be troubled with drought or high water."  
In the article written by W. S. Cleveland on "tide water power and its possibilities" in the Scientific American, December 24, 1906, he says: "The immense volume of water subjected to extraordinary tidal action on the Bay of Fundy coast affords a limitless field for the development of cheap power and consequent industrial activity. The tides in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick would afford an aggregate power far beyond the utmost capacity of Niagara."

## Salvation Army Laborers.

The Salvation Army has just closed a very successful year of immigration work, having brought out seventeen thousand settlers to Canada, but seeing that this amount was very far short of the demand for farm help and laborers of various kinds, they have decided to bring out this year, at least twenty-five thousand for agricultural and other purposes.

Small parties will arrive on all regular boats of the Allan, Dominion and C. P. R. lines from the middle of November up to February, followed by ten chartered steamers carrying fifteen hundred each, and special conducted parties on all regular boats up to the last of April.

Staff-Captain Jennings, who represents the work for the maritime provinces, is anxious that all who seek help should be supplied while the immigrants are landing at Halifax and St. John, as it is very difficult to get them to come down this way after the boats begin to land at Quebec.

Last year a number of applications were not filled owing to the fact that some farmers delayed the matter until late in the season; those who will need laborers this winter or in the coming spring, should apply now, stating the date men will be required. This would prevent them having to wait a long time or being disappointed altogether.

## San Jose Scale Found in Ontario.

TORONTO, October 28.—Five carloads of fruit, principally pears, literally plastered with the dreaded San Jose scale, are in custody of the provincial officers at Grimsby. The inspectors are also awaiting two other cars now enroute, which will also be seized on entry into the province. The fruits have been shipped in from the United States, most of it from Maryland, to the Canadian canning factories. The fruit growers of the district held an emergency meeting and called the government to destroy the fruit and fumigate the cars. This will likely be done. It is said to be the first time tainted fruit has been brought into the Dominion.

An official investigation will probably be followed by prosecution under the provincial law.

Victoria health officers are busy devising ways and means of preventing bubonic plague, now in Seattle, from spreading over the Canadian border.
