has been closed without having been read before a Quorum of the said Committee, in the presence of the witness?—I believe it was always the case.

J. Duval, Esquire, one of the Members of the Committee; a witness produced by Mr. Stuart, and interrogated by him, answered as follows:

Were you a Member of the Committe of Grievances last year? -Yes.

Did you regularly attend the sittings of the Committe last year?—No; I did not attend every sitting of the Committee. I attended chiefly when I was called upon to form a Quorum.

Were you present at the examination of some witnesses, and of whom?—On reference to the report of the Committee, my name will be found as being pre-

sent at the sittings of the Committee which I attended.

Did you attend for the purpose of examining the witnesses, or when their examination was read to them? I attended when the questions were put to the witnesses, and the answers received from them. I remarked particular delicacy on the part of the Members not to proceed without a Quorum. I attended particularly during the absence of Mr. Bedard, the Chairman, which lasted more than a week.

Is Mr. Labrie one of the Members of the Committee, living or dead, and are Mr. Bedard and Mr. Brooks present?—Mr. Labrie is dead; Mr. Bedard absent in Europe, and Mr. Brooks absent.

Is it not within your knowledge that no evidence has been closed before the Committee, without having been read before a Quorum of the Committee, and inthe presence of the witness?—To the best of my recollection, they were fully explained to the witnesses before a Quorum of the Committee.

Louis Bourdages, Esquire, Chairman of the Committee, examined by Mr. Stuart:

Were you a Member of the Committee of Grievances last year?—Yes. Did you regularly attend the sittings of the Committee last year?—I do not recollect; it may be known by the minutes of the Committee at what sit-

tings I was present:

At the times when you so assisted, was it for the purpose of hearing and examining witness, or in order to form a Quorum for reading the testimony which had been given? -By the minutes of the said Committee, it appears that I was present when the evidence was read to the witness, but I cannot recollect whether I was one of the Members who assisted at the examination.

Did the examination of witnesses often take place in the said Committee, in the absence of a Quorum?—The Committee very often permitted the Chairman and some other Members of the Committee to take down the evidence, considering the difficulty there existed of keeping up a Quorum constantly; but the Committee have always taken particular care to cause the witnesses who had given information in that way to appear before a Quorum, when the evidence was carefully read over to them, in the presence of the said Quorum, and the informant acknowledged the correctness of the interrogations, and of his answers.
