and on the other occasions took second place.

The 6th Regiment had the distinction of being the first Regiment in Canada to win the Gordon Highlanders' Musketry Trophy, a challenge trophy presented by the 1st Battalion Gordon Highlanders to commemorate their comradeship with the Royal Canadian Regiment and other Canadian Corps in South Africa.

Of late years the Regiment has always had representatives on the Bisley team, in some years there being as many as three or four out of the twenty sent to represent Canada. This standard is still being maintained, and there will be three men on next year's team.

In 1905, Capt. W. H. Forrest and Capt. J. Duff Stuart, both shot on the Canadian team which won the Kolapore Cups, and were the recipients of gold medals presented by the Dominion Government.

A pleasing and interesting phase connected

with the development of rifle shooting is the Annual International Competition which has been arranged with the 2nd Regiment National Guard of Washington. Each team has won one contest.

Col. Denny, an Imperial Officer who was for a short time connected with the Canadian Militia as Chief Intelligence Officer, was on Lord Dundonald's staff when the latter inspected the Regiment two years ago. Colonel Denny recently wrote a special article on the Canadian Militia for an English magazine, in which he stated that the 6th Regiment "The Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles" was one of the smartest regiments he had seen in Canada.

The object of all connected with the Regiment is to maintain and improve its smartness and efficiency, so that if at any time its services are needed by the Country in the stern abitrament of war, it will do honor to itself and the name it bears, and live up to the motto on its coat of arms: "Celer et Fortis."
