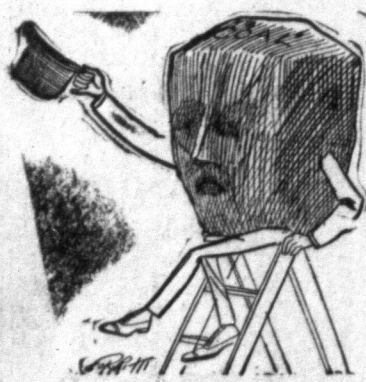

A GOVERNMENT OF BUSINESS MEN

Lord Rosebery Would Like to see the Experiment Tried for a Year.

A Plea for Harmony of the Contending Parties When Great Measures are at Stake.

London, Nov. 14. — Lord Rosebery, speaking to-night in Edinburgh, said he did not intend again to try to secure a reform of the House of Lords, as this was not a task for an individual, but one needing a national impulse. "I would like to see," he continued, "an experiment for a year of a Government formed entirely of business men, such for example as Mr. Carnegie and Sir Thomas Lipton, instead of politicians. I would ask you, are we getting our money's worth for the money spent? We are beginning to learn the lesson that great measures must in future be carried more by the harmony of contending parties or by the agreement of belligerent politicians than by the overpowering ascendancy of any one faction in the country."

Continuing, the speaker said he blamed no party and blamed no government, but saw around him questions demanding solution and a general apathy and impotence to deal with them. Political parties, he said, must on occasions be willing to sink their differences and forget who was to power and who would get credit for the carrying out of measures if they wish those measures to be carried out.

TO WATCH STRIKERS.

Earlington, Ky., November 14.—Adj.-Gen. David Murray, who has been in Madisonville for two days looking into the mining situation, this afternoon telephoned the governor recommending that troops again be sent to Hopkins county.

FRUIT SHIPMENTS.

Alex. McNeill, fruit inspector for Western Ontario, has just returned from a trip to Montreal, where he was investigating complaints regarding the poor condition in which fruit was shipped. He found that Keefer pears, which are good keepers, were so soft that water was running from the crates. This was owing to the fruit having been shipped in ordinary boxes here and being heated, ripened in four or five days as much as in two months in an ordinary temperature. He advises that fruit should be shipped in salt cars when refrigerator cars are unavailable.

NEW MACHINERY

Dawley Steel and Axle Works Will soon be in Operation.

In conversation with a Planet reporter this morning, Mr. Dawley, of the local steel works, said: "We have received several cars of axle billet, and one car of spring steel, and we expect to have the axle part of the works running in about two weeks."

Six cars of machinery have already been placed and several more are on their way. Two of the machines are upsetting machines, weighing fourteen tons, and the other a Yeakley hammer, weighs six tons.

A WATERLOGGED STEAMER.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 14.—A special from Port Hope, Mich., says: "The steamer Emerald, from Alpena to Detroit, loaded with lumber and cedar, sprung a leak and became waterlogged in the heavy gale last night, off Point Aux Barques. The life-saving crew rescued the crew of nine this morning in a freezing condition. The men could not have held out much longer. No effort was made to save the steamer, which is now drifting down Lake Huron in a waterlogged condition. The Emerald was of 348 gross tons, 140 feet over all, with 30 feet beam. She was owned by Thomas M. Ryan, of Buffalo."

DEAD IN A FIELD.

Tottenham, Ont., Nov. 14.—Patrick McGovern, a healthy, respected farmer of Adolph, left his home on Thursday morning, and not returning by evening his friends became alarmed, and after searching for him, he was found dead in a field on a neighboring farm. The night being very dark it is thought he must have lost his way, and accidentally fallen, stunned himself, and did not regain consciousness. Deceased, who was 35 years of age, leaves a wife and nine children. McGovern's brother, Thomas, was killed by a train in Toronto about two years ago.

NO OFFER FROM CANADA.

Ottawa, Nov. 14.—Mr. Brodriek, the British War Secretary, in speaking at a banquet in London last night, said that only that day a colony had offered help for the South African war. No new offer has been made by Canada, so it was not the Dominion to which he referred.
