

Matriculation.

Candidates for matriculation will be examined, at the close of the College year, or on the day before the opening of the first Term, in Arithmetic, English Grammar, Geography, English, Grecian, and Roman History; and in Algebra, as contained in the first six books of Davies' Bourdon—or an equivalent.

They must be thoroughly acquainted with the Latin and Greek Grammars, and be able to translate and parse accurately two books of Cæsar, two books of the Æneid of Virgil, two Orations of Cicero, and two books of Xenophon's Anabasis.

No Candidate will be admitted unless he has completed his fifteenth year.

Candidates may enter advanced Classes after undergoing satisfactory examination in the previous studies of the Course.
