BRITAIN WON'T RECOGNIZE BULGARIA'S INDEPENDENCE

Will First Obtain Views of Other Great Powers... Chances of War Minimized by Britain and France

Advise Turkey Against It—Turkey Disposed to Accept It

LONDON, Oct. 5.—In the ancient capital of Thracia, the independence of Bulgaria was proclaimed today, with the Czar of the Bulgarians as ruler. Czar of the Bulgarians is recognized to mean more than Czar of Bulgaria, because it is a distinct intimation that he regards his country as having sovereignty over all people of that blood in the near east.

From all the capitals tonight come reports indicating that it means, first of all, another European congress, of the signers of the treaty of Berlin to consider the situation and probably to revise the treaty.
