LONDON, Oct. 5-In the ancient cap-Bulgaria was proclaimed today, with the Czar of the Bulgarians as ruler. Czar of the Bulgarians is recognized mean more than Czar of Bulgaria, because it is a distinct intimation that he regards his country as having sov ereignty over all people of that blood in the near east. Within a day or two Austria-Hungary, which has been working with Prince Ferdinand in this preconcerted plan, will proclaim the new status of Bosnia and Herzegovina. The chances of war between Bulgaria and Turkey are being minimized by Great Britain and France, who are working together, and who have advised Turkey against it. Turkey apparently is disposed to follow this advice and it is believed that if hasty action on the part of Turkey can be prevented there will be no war. PARIS, Oct. 5.-France has essayed the role of mediator with the object of preventing war between Turkey and Bulgaria and as a result of Foreign Minister Pinchon's series of conferences today with the representatives of the powers, including M. Iswolsky, the Russian Foreign Minister, Naoum Pasha, the Turkish ambassador to France, the Austro-Hungarian, the British, the American and the Italian ambassadors and of active exchanges which have been going on between the various cabinets, it was announced tonight that France, Great Britain, Russia and possibly Italy were prepared to act in unison to preserve peace and to call a conference of the signatories of the Berlin treaty to deal diplomatically with the situation that has arisen between Turkey and Bulgaria and to harmonize conflicting interests so that fresh complications may be avoided.
