EX-LT. CODERRE FOUND GUILTY

Convicted of Murder of Sgt. Ozanne of 9th Mounted Rifles.

PRISONER DENIES THE CRIME
Condemned Man Married in Montreal Before Going Overseas.

London, Feb. 7.—Twenty minutes after retiring the jury at the Winchester Assizes returned on Saturday afternoon a verdict of guilty against George Coderre, late Lieutenant of the 41st Canadian Battalion, indicted for the murder of Sergeant Ozanne of the 9th Mounted Rifles, whose mutilated body was found in the stables of the regiment on December 9.

"You add nothing about the state of his mind," inquired Justice Dalrymple. "We find him guilty," gravely responded the foreman. Coderre was sentenced to death.

Throughout the two days' hearing the prisoner sat between his guards in the big dock listening acutely, but never betraying any excitement. Now on being called upon to say why the sentence should not be passed, he spoke for the first time since pleading not guilty. "All I have to say is I am not the man who did it," he declared, standing erect and showing no sign of emotion.

"George Coderre," said the Judge, with a black cap on his head and the Sheriff and chaplain at his side, "the jury have found you guilty of the willful murder of Sgt. Ozanne. There is not the slightest possible doubt that you are the man who did it. The only ground upon which you could have been defended successfully was that which the jury have carefully considered and have rejected, which was that you were not sane when you killed him. The circumstances of the case show that this was a carefully thought out murder. You had resolved upon it some time before; you did it in order either to obtain money which you were not entitled to or to avoid paying money you were bound to pay."

Two mental experts gave directly contrary conclusions of the independent examinations of the prisoner. One of these mentioned that the common law definition of England was insane. "Thomas Carlyle put the proportion much higher," drily remarked the Judge.

Agent General Pelletier informs us that a petition for the reprieve will be submitted to the Home Secretary. When the war broke out Coderre was among the first to enlist, but after going to England with a battalion was sent back in three months. Soon after his return the 41st battalion was organized, and Coderre got another commission. Shortly before his departure he married in Montreal.
