The Situation.

Frederick Palmer, one of the most reliable correspondents at the front reports that the operations in the vicinity of Ypres, have passed "into a new and for the British a most satisfactory stage."

That the remarkable Russian advance in connection with the Galician operations is not in any sense of a sporadic nature is abundantly proved by the fact that the great drive still continues without any sign of diminution.

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Since Russia started to land those wallows on Austria's anatomy, the official reports from Berlin have referred to the "German troops" only.

Premier Hughes.

During his visit to the Old Country Mr. Hughes, the Prime Minister of Australia has been talking out in vigorous fashion.

The issue of the war means life or death to Labour. Britain, which believes in Liberty and Right, is arrayed against a people governed by Despotism and believing in Force.

It is the people's war. They alone can ensure victory; but victory can only be won by organization.

British industries, as a whole, are not organized at all; to compete successfully with those of other nations they must be as completely organized as an army.

Until we organize on a national basis, as Germany has done, we cannot hope to win the war or hold our own in trade.

New industries need to be created to help industries formerly dependent on German help; and science must be called in to help.

More food must be grown at home, and the balance necessary obtained within the Empire.

The welfare of the nation depends on its crop of men; and industry must be so organized as to secure a numerous and virile people.

This war has given hundreds of thousands of men and women their first taste of decent wages and labour conditions. If they do not want to go back to the old conditions or worse they must look to their future now, while they have the opportunity.

If we do not act promptly, industrial chaos will accompany peace. The people must organize, not only to win the war, but to reap and retain the fruits of victory.

Do not be gulled by parrot talk about Free Trade. Labour owes nothing to the policy of laissez faire, which is hopelessly unfitted to cope with this great crisis.

Here is one sample of his vigorous style: "Victory can only be achieved by organization. We must organize to win the war. We must organize to reap and retain the fruits of victory."

Let me speak more particularly of industrial organization. Organization is absolutely essential to success in the modern industrial world. The industries of Britain, taken as a whole are not organized at all.

President Wilson and his advisers are anxious to deal with the Carranza note in such fashion that action cannot be attributed to domestic politics.

As prepared by Secretary Lansing, it is understood the note flatly declines to withdraw American troops from Mexico until the de facto government has shown both its willingness and its ability to police the border states properly.

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STEAMER ASHORE ON SUGAR LOAF

San Francisco, June 15.—The steamer Bear of the San Francisco and Portland Steamship Company, south bound with 100 passengers and crew of 82 men from Portland, Ore., for San Francisco, went ashore last night on Sugar Loaf, Cape Mendocino, and passengers and crew were compelled to take refuge in the ship's lifeboats.

A radio message received early today reported that all lifeboats had gotten safely away from the ship, and were waiting in smooth water the arrival of the rescue boats.
