NEWS OF NORFOLK POET WHO WROTE ON PEACE, BUT DIED IN THE GREAT WAR

Petty Pilfering in Simcoe—Soldier's Wife's Potato Patch Looted. OTHER SIMCOE NEWS Two Families Arraigned in Police Court on Charge of Theft. ANOTHER CASUALTY Pte. Frank William Hunt in Hospital, A Gas Victim.

(Montreal Star) Last week brought the news that Francis Ledwidge, author of the "Song of Peace," had been killed. We have to sacrifice our young poets like our other youth, even though all poets are born for a life of peace. But we feel the loss of this one peculiarly, not only because of his promise, but because in all his work he is a poet of peace. Even when a soldier he could not write of war. He did his duty, but he was homesick for peace all the while, and in his book he expresses his longing, not in any weak complaints, but in the memory and evocation of peaceful images. No one can say what he would have done had he lived. One cannot be confident about the promise of the queer tender beauty in these poems.
