DO NOT MISQUOTE FIGURES

Some advertisers are using the In-
land Revenue Department's recent
official report upon baking powders
to show the comparative strength and
qualities of these articles as they are
sold in the Dominion. It is not fair,
however, either to the Analysis or to
the public in making this use of the
official figures that they should be
done in some instances.

The following figures are copied
from the official report printed by the
Canadian Government and show cor-
rectly, as per that document, the re-
lative strength value of the baking
powders named. The analyses in all
cases were made by the Government

Analysis:—

Per cent. of available
leaving gas.
"Royal" (average of three highest
tests), 13.4
"Cleveland" (average of two
highest tests) 13.
"Dearborn" (average of three
highest tests) 11.7
"Imperial" (average of two high-
est tests) 9.9
"Magic" (contains alum) (aver-
age of three highest tests), 7.7

These tests should set the baking
powder question at rest.—Montreal
Pharmaceutical Journal.
