VENEZUELA IS
SETTLING UP

PAYMENTS TO ALLIED POWERS
WILL BE COMPLETED IN
JULY.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The state department today received a dispatch from William Russell, the American Minister at Caracas, Venezuela, stating that the payments to the allied powers, Germany, Great Britain and Italy, agreed upon under the blockade several years ago, will be completed about July 1st. After that date the only payments will be on account of the exchanges in the currency of the United States, Mexico, the Netherlands, Sweden and Belgium will then come in for settlement. Monthly payments will be made to these countries from the customs receipts of Venezuela.

HEADQUARTERS AT REGINA.

TO RE-ARRANGE
MOUNTED POLICE

SEVERITY OF WINTER CAUSED
CONCENTRATION OF STRENGTH
AT CERTAIN POINTS.

OTTAWA, May 8.—The termination of the western strike will be an immense relief to the mounted police who have been hung up in the oddest manner during its continuance. Urgent need exists for a redistribution of the force throughout the two prairie provinces.

For one thing, the severity of the winter caused the force to be put on patrol work in the Saskatchewan settlements. The winter is over and it is necessary to return the men to their normal stations. Again they have an accumulation of prisoners at points like Calgary and as the prison accommodation is insufficient, a comparatively large number of constables is needed at each place to guard them. To effect this, the action men have had to be withdrawn from important outlying points, so that on this score also a redistribution is urgently necessary. But in the frame of mind which existed among the western public while the mining trouble was in progress, it would be moved for this purpose without it being construed into a movement towards the miners. As a result men needed at Lethbridge have been detained at Calgary, men needed at Calgary have been left at Regina, and an embargo has been laid on the entire force.

TERROR REGNS
IN GUATEMALA

GENERAL EXODUS OF BETTER
CLASSES—GEN. TOLEDO
TO HEAD REVOLUTION.

MEXICO CITY, May 12.—It has been learned that General Salvador Toledo, who is designated as the leader of the coming revolution against the Cabreria Government in Guatemala, is enroute to New Orleans and will reach there in about a week. Gen. Toledo is said to have completed all arrangements for the invasion of Guatemala and the actual fighting will start within thirty days.

According to refugees a veritable reign of terror exists in Guatemala. Ten thousand of the wealthy and business classes have left Guatemala since the alleged attempts at revolution. The stories of the atrocities practised in the overcrowded prisons are revolting in the extreme. Cabreria is said to have 23,000 troops along the Mexican and Honduran frontiers.

FRAUD IMPERILS
SEVERAL LIVES

SEAMEN ALLEGED TO BE EN-
DANGERED BY POOR BOILER
TUBING.

PITTSBURGH, May 9.—Wholesale trifling with the lives of American seamen was alleged at the opening in the United States District Court today of the case against J. J. Dunn, Charles L. Closs and Frank L. Emmet, charged with conspiring to furnish defective boiler tubes for some of the largest vessels in the United States navy. These men were employed at the plant of the Shelby Tube Company at Greenville, Pa., which had a subsidiary contract from the Babcock & Wilcox Company for 450,000 feet of boiler tubing.

Emmet, who made the information that set these proceedings on foot, pleaded guilty. The other two pleaded not guilty. United States District Attorney, Dunn, in opening, explained that Emmet had turned state's evidence to tell the sensational details of this alleged plot to defraud the government and place the war vessels, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, Maryland, Charleston, Nebraska, Minnesota, Vermont, Washington, Tennessee in jeopardy. Each vessel named carried a crew of from 600 to 800 men, whose lives would be in constant danger.

He told how the alleged plot was carried out, including the theft of government inspectors' stamps from a desk and the placing of them on tubes to secure their acceptance. Leading officials of many of the big shipbuilding concerns have been summoned as witnesses in this case.

DIGS GRAVE AND
WILLS HERSELF

"MAKING A PLACE TO DIE IN."
GIRL DECLARES WHEN DIG-
GING TRENCH.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 9.—Brooding over a disappointment in love affairs, Miss A. Ellison, a servant in the employ of Stirling Johnson, of No. 501, Allen Lane, Chestnut Hill, committed suicide early this morning after having first dug a grave in the cellar of the house.

Miss Ellison was twenty-five years old. She was brought from New York by Mr. Johnson about four months ago. Her sweetheart ceased paying her attentions several weeks ago and the young woman became melancholy. Mrs. Mary Snell, the housekeeper, found the young woman in the cellar yesterday digging a long deep hole in the earth floor.

"What in the world are you doing?" asked the astonished woman. "Making a place to die in," replied the servant. "Well, you get up stairs and forget this nonsense," said the housekeeper, for the time the matter was forgotten. Mrs. Snell and the servant arose early this morning. The housekeeper went to the kitchen to prepare breakfast, and the girl remained up stairs to make the bed.

THUGS IMPEDE
PARIS FIREMEN

WHILE FIGHTING FIRES BELIEV-
ED TO HAVE BEEN OF INCON-
SIDERABLE IMPORTANCE.

PARIS, May 12.—The entire fire-fighting force of the city was called out tonight to fight two great fires, both believed to have been of incendiary origin. The first was at the Avenue de la République, where violent demonstrations made the work of the firemen perilous, and the second was at Lachapelle street. The loss at the latter place was estimated at 200,000 francs. The firemen were impeded by a mob of thugs who cut the hose and pillaged the houses from the occupants.

Many persons were injured and two firemen are believed to have perished.

BLOWS OUT BRAINS
FARMER LOSES LIFE
WITH A SHOTGUN
IN BOGGY CREEK

Hired Hand on Thos. Young's Farm Near the City Commits Rash Act.

From Monday Morning's Leader.
John L. Denne, a hired man on the farm of Thomas Young, near the Indian Industrial School, committed suicide by shooting on Saturday afternoon or evening.

Denne, who was a man of about 40 years of age, had been in the employ of Mr. Young for about two years. A portion of his duties was to deliver milk in the city and he was addicted to strong drink. He came to the city as usual on Saturday, returning to the farm about noon. He was drinking and milk cans had not been washed as usual and, upon entering Denne's room a horrible sight was seen. Denne had thrown himself down on his back on his cot and had taken a dose of cyanide, both barrels being loaded and the hammer pulled up, and had placed the muzzle against his right temple with the lower side of the gun out tonight to fight two great fires, both believed to have been of incendiary origin.

Holding the muzzle firmly against his head with his left hand he had reached down and shoved back the trigger with his right. The big charge contained in a No. 12 Ely shell literally tore the top off the man's head and spat out his brains all over the opposite walls. The dead man fell over on the cot, his left hand still retaining its grip on the barrel of the gun.

Mr. Young immediately notified the Police at the barracks and a man was dispatched to the scene of the tragedy. The coroner notified. He at once saw that it was a clear case of suicide and that no inquest was necessary. The dead man had no relatives in this country.

GUATEMALA ARMY'S
DEVILISH ATROCITY

STRIPPED OF CLOTHING, POLI-
TICAL OPPONENT IS PLACED
ON ANT HILL.

NEW ORLEANS, May 10.—Dispatches from Puerto Cortes, Honduras yesterday say, the Guatemalan government is committing unspeakable outrages. Even women and children are not being spared. A family of four was massacred by soldiers near Guatemala City by order of the government. Cabreria, one of the Guatemalan political opponents, near Livingston, was tied to a stake in the middle of a hill of poisonous ants. His clothing was stripped from his body, and the soldiers danced around his writhing form as the insects stung him to death.

Refugees report that two Americans, C. L. Lullien, of Little Rock, Ark., and Marshall Stamm, of Cincinnati, Ohio, are in jail in Guatemala. City, charged with alleged complicity in the conspiracy to assassinate President Cabreria.

This was done, and today he was ordered by the local justice of the peace to pay a fine of \$20 and costs.

VON BEHRING IS IN HEALTH.

Discoverer of Diphtheria Serum Suffered From Nervous Depression.

ROME, May 10.—Prof. Emil von Behring, discoverer of diphtheria serum, who recently suffered from nervous depression superinduced by overwork, arrived here in perfect health and paid a visit to the university. He says he is vigorously continuing his research into tuberculosis and hopes to neutralize the deadly effect of the disease.

A FAKED FIGHT.

CORBY DISTILLERY DESTROYED.

Fire Wipes Out Canada's Oldest Distillery and Does \$250,000 Damage.

BELLEVIEW, ONT., May 12.—The Corby distillery at Lawrenceville, about a mile from this city, was completely destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning. The loss of the distillery was estimated at \$250,000. The fire started in one of the distilling rooms and was beyond control before noticed. The destroyed building was the oldest distillery in Canada and was erected by the late Henry Corby in 1859. Rebuilding will be commenced at once.

EMINENT SCIENTIST FORECASTS
