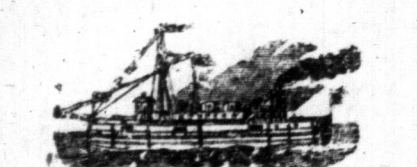

THE EMPRESS MUST GO

And Prince Tuan Must be Arrested and Punished in Russia's Demands

Berlin, Sept. 14.—The news bureau sent to China by the German fleet society, cables from Shanghai that it has received the following telegram from the Russian government: "The Russian government makes the following ultimatum:—

"The Emperor of China shall resume the government himself and shall have Prince Tuan, the boxer leader, arrested and punished, and shall exclude the Empress from any influence upon the government."

"Li Hung Chang has declared that all these demands are unacceptable except the first, and has abandoned his proposed departure for the north."

The Lokal Anzeiger has received the following from its Shanghai correspondent: "It is announced from Nankin that the viceroy has ordered action from Germany. The Taotai of Nankin has ordered 3,000 men mustered into service and the same number recruited among the salt smugglers, whose chief has been appointed commander of 30 war junks."

"The German protected cruiser Seeadler passed Nankin with her decks cleared for action."

"Li Hung Chang has abandoned the peace negotiations because Prince Tuan is opposed to them. The mandarins recognize only Prince Tuan's authority, fearing his vengeance."

"Gen. Yung Lu is at Ta-Tung-Fu with the Empress Dowager, who refuses to leave that place."

ARE IN PROGRESS.

In the Negotiations for the Settlement of the Chinese Question.

Russia and Germany Believed to be Anxious to Oblivion the Empire.

London, Sept. 14.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Associated Press, wiring Wednesday confirming the report as to three of the four conditions proposed by a certain power as the basis of negotiations, says he has it from a Pekin source, usually reliable, that Prince Ching has already begun to negotiate, but that the second condition is the treatment of the Manchurian province, including the Liao-Tung peninsula as a buffer state.

The Chinese minister has received a despatch from Li Hung Chang, announcing that he expects to leave Shanghai to-day (Friday) for the north. Earl Li should reach Tientsin in about three days and a half. At Tien-Tsin Li will formally assume the viceroyship of the province of Chi-Li, to which he was appointed some time. After a short rest at Tien-Tsin he will proceed to Pekin, where it is expected he will promptly open negotiations with the representatives of the powers for the settlement of peace terms.

The Times has an interesting despatch from Pekin, dated September 22, 1900. The British general was in a position to make an announcement. There is every indication, however, that Lord Salisbury has decided that our present attitude and position in regard to the Chinese situation is almost inevitable. The Empress Dowager and the Emperor, in order to be enabled to wield their influence through them over the remaining provinces, must be preserved from China's enemies.

The Empress Dowager has retained Prince Ching's son as a hostage for his father."

RAGING IN FULL FURY

Texas Hurricane has Reached St. Johns, N. F.

St. Johns, N. F., Sept. 14.—The Texas hurricane reached here last night, and is raging with full fury this evening. It has swept the coast, wrecking many fishing paces. Numerous schooners have been driven ashore near St. Johns, and the telegraph wires in some localities are down. It is not known how much damage has been done at distant points, but it is believed the storm must have worked havoc among the fishing vessels on the Grand Banks, as the wind has blown from every quarter of the compass within the last twenty-four hours.

THE WEST ELGIN CASE

The Election Petition Dismissed With Costs on Petitioner.

Toronto, Sept. 13.—The West Elgin petition, which asked for a commission to take the evidence of W. Trick, now in Michigan, was dismissed this morning with costs by Chief Justice Falconbridge and Justice Street, and Finlay MacBarnid, M. P. P., is confirmed in his seat. The court said they knew of no case where agency had been established, and, it being manifest that the proposed commission could not benefit the petitioner, they did not consider it expedient to allow the additional expense it would incur, and therefore refused the commission. The court added that all the charges had failed.

AN UNDISMISSED FLIGHT.

That is What Paul Kruger's Exit into Portuguese Territory is Considered.

London, Sept. 13.—All the morning papers publish sketches of Mr. Kruger's extraordinary career. The editorials comment upon his humiliating and undramatic exit, which is universally regarded as less perplexing than, and therefore preferable to, capture. His flight with the bullion is regarded as putting an undignified end to his legal pretensions.

The Standard regards it as an informal confession of defeat, and as marking the close of the campaign. It half regrets that he was not compelled to surrender in person, but contends that as a practical matter his flight is more convenient than his capture would have been.

The Morning Post and the Daily Telegraph, on the contrary, say they do not venture to believe that his departure necessarily implies the end of the war. They fear a prolongation of guerrilla warfare, though the Morning Post considers Capt. Reichmann's recall by the American War Department as being of the utmost significance.

The Daily News regards it as probable that the only duty of Acting President Schalkbarger will be to accept the humiliation President Kruger avoided—that is, to make submission to the British. The Daily News and the Chronicle dwell upon the pathos of President Kruger's position. Some of the other papers, however, condemn what they call his meanness in forsaking the burghers whom he misled.

1,000 DEAD BODIES.

Lying on the Beach at Bolivar in East Bay, Texas.

Houston, Texas, Sept. 13.—B. F. Cameron, of Stowell, says that the relief party which went from Stowell to Bolivar reported to him that over 1,000 dead bodies were on the beach at Bolivar, in East Bay and in sight of the salt marshes which line the bay. The others are lying in the water and on land, mixed with the carcasses of animals and all decomposing in the heat and giving forth a horrible stench. It will be necessary to collect the corpses and to burn them to prevent an outbreak of an epidemic.

THEY WON'T GIVE UP

Public School Property for the Use of Separate Schools.

"You might just say that while separate schools will no doubt be established in Windsor, the board of education has no intention of facilitating matters by giving up St. Francis and St. Alphonsus schools," said Trustee John Campbell Wednesday morning to the Detroit News. "Of course I'm only one member, but the general opinion seems to be that we cannot trust the board of education. We need them. We'll employ Catholic teachers for these two schools, and continue them on their present basis for the accommodation of Catholics who don't wish to support separate schools. If there are only enough Catholics children for one school, we'll use the other as a Protestant public school. Our other schools are becoming crowded, and we can easily make use of an extra one."
