ed and Punished is Russia's

Berlin, Sept. 14.-The news bureau sent to China by the German fleet society, cables from Shanghai that it has received the following telegram from the Russian government: "The Russian government makes the following ultimatum:

"The Emperor of China shall resume the government himself and shall have Prince Tuan, the boxer leader, arrested and punished, and shall exclude the Empress from any influence upon the government.

"Li Hung Chang has declared that all these demands are unacceptable except the first, and has abandoned his proposed departure for the north." The Lokal Anzeiger has received the following from its Shanghai corres-"It is announced from Nankin that

Russia and Germany Believed to be Anxious to Uismember the Empire.

London, Sept. 14.-The Shanghai corerspondent of the Associated Press, wiring Wednesday confirming the report as to three of the four conditions proposed by a certain power as the basis of negotions, says he has it from Pekin source, usually reliable, that Prince Ching has already begun to neotiate, but that the second condition the treatment of the Manchurian province, including the Liao-Tung peninsula as a buffer state.

The Times has an interesting despatch from Pekin, dated September 4th, which says in part:—"Russia has decided to withdraw her legation from Pekin, leaving a purely military command, an official announcement command, an official announcement is expected to-day. The other pow-ers will also presumably withdraw their legations, leaving Pekin under the military control of the allies during the winter at least. At a meet-ing of the generals the Russian comander annonunced that Russia would maintain 15,000 troops during the winter. The German commander said that Germany would keep the same number, and the Japanese comman-der announced that Japan will have 22,000. The British general was not i na position to make an announce-ment. There is every indication, how-ever, that Lord Salisbury has ilecided that our present subordinate posi-tion in Pekin must become still humer. In the best informed quarters the opinion is expressed that Russia and Germany are acting in accord, Russia seeking the definite alienation of all territory north of the Wall, and Germany the arresation of Shan-Tung, Kiang-Su, and the Yang Tse provinces. Pretoria, Sept. 14.—It is evident from the nature of the wounds of the British troops now being sent to the hospitals here from the front, that the Boers are running short of ammunition for their rifles, and are us-ing Martini-Henry and sporting guns There has been a noticeable increase in the number of wounds caused from the last-named guns in the past two months. Previous to that time the wounds were mostly all caused by Mauser bullets.

Texas Hurricane has keached St. Johns, N. F

St. Johns, N. F., Sept. 14,-The Texas hurricane reached here last night, and is raging with full fury this evening. It has swept the coast, wrecking many fishing places. Numerous schooners have been driven ashore near St. Johns, and the telegraph wires in some localities are down. It is not known now much damage has is not known now much damage has been done at distant points, but it is believed the storm must have work ed havor among the fishing vessels on the Grand Banks, as the wind has blown from every quarter of the compass within the last twenty-four

The Election Petition Dismissed With Costs on Petitoner.

Toronto, Sept. 13.-The West Elgin petition, which asked for a commission to take the evidence of W. Trick, now in Michigan, was dismissed this morning with costs by Chief Justice Falconbridge and Justice Street, and Finlay MacDiarmid, M. P. P., is confirmed in his seat. The court said they knew of no case where agency had been established, and, it being manifest that the proposed commis-sion could not benefit the patitioner they did not consider it expedient to allow the additional expense it would incur, and therefore retused the commission. The court added that all the charges had failed.

AN UNDIUNIFIED FLIGHT.

That is What Paul Kruger's Exit Into Portuguese Territory is Considered.

London, Sept. 13 .- All the morning papers publish sketches of Mr. Kruger's extraordinary career. The editorials comment upon his humiliating and undramatic exit, which is universally regarded as less perplexing than, and therefore preferable to capture. His flight with the bullion is regarded as putting an undignified end to his legal pretensions. The Standard regards it as an in-formal confession of defeat, and as marking the close of the campaign. It

half regrets that he was not com-pelled to surrender in person, but contends that as a practical matter his flight is more convenient than his capture would have been.

The Morning Post and the Daily Telegraph, on the contrary, say they do not venture to believe that his de-

parture necessarily implies the end of the war. They fear a prolongation of guerilla warfare, though the Morning Post considers Capt. Reichmann's re-call by the American War Depart-ment as being of the utmost signifi-

The Baily News regards it as pro-able that the only duty of Acting President Schalkburger will be to ac-President Schalkburger will be to accept the humil ation President Kruger avoided—that is, to make submission to the British. The Daily News and the Chronicle dwell upon the pathos of President Kruger's position. Some of the other papers, however, condemn what they call his meanness in forsaking the burghers whom he misled.

1,000 DEAD BODIES

Lying on the Beach at Bolivar in East Bay, Texas.

Houston, Texas, Sept. 13.-B. F Cameron, of Stowell, says that the relef party which went from Stowell to Bolivar reported to him that over 1,000 dead bodies were on the beach at Bolivar, in East Bay and in sight of the salt marshes which line the bay. The party succeeded in burying but 40. The others are lying in the water and on land, mixed with the carcasses of aniamls and all decomposing in the heat and giving forth a horrible stench. It will be necessary to col-lect the corpses and to burn them to prevent an outbreak of an epidemic.
