CHINESE SITUATION ABRAHAM PLAINS

Them to the Ursuline Nuns.

Quebec, Que., Aug. 19 .- The delay in the transfer of the Plains of Abraham still remains a vexed question. The citizens of Quebec, in fact the whole Canadian public, who have takter, were under the impression that the transaction was closed over a

month ago, and that the deeds only required the signature of the Federal Authorities and Hon. S. N. Parent, transfer. This was practically the situation, but at the final moment, and when things were in readiness, the legal advisers of the Ursuline nuns, served a notice on the interested parties, including the Mayor of Que ebc, stating that they were not ready to close the deal, pending new negotiations with the city anent the putting in of the water and drain pipes in the Marchment property. The Mayor was asked if this demand, which awaited his answer, would oc-casion delay or lead up to the break-

ing off of the negotiations. He said that it would probably lead to some delay in the transfer, which, he hopably settled, but he did not see how it could rupture the negotiations in any way. The Ursuline nuns had agreed to sell their property for a certain sum of money to the Federal Government. The Government accepted the terms, and the property was offered to the City of Quebec as a gift, with certain provisions, which were laid before the city council and adopted, hence the transaction was concluded as far as the Federal Government was concerned, the present difficulty arising at the last moment with the city, although everything had been settled. The legal adviser of the nuns would rather have to stand by their agreement, or they would call up the Federal government to expropriate the property.

BY THE DUKE OF YORK. Montreal, Aug. 19 .- The memorial tablet erected to the memory of the late Major Borden in McGill College, of which he was an under-graduate, will be unveiled by the Duke of York on September 20, the second day of his visit in this city. Borden, it will be remembered, was one of the brave Canadians who fell on the battle field in South Africa, and was a son of Hon. Dr. Borden, Minister of Militia.
