mine in the town, W. F. Young, once the largest number of students in of the Kingston Whig, but now edi-attendance in the history of the coltor of the World, a bright little wekly. He told me that the crops were good this year and a farmer cutting grain near the town had used 27 1-2 lbs. of twine for seven acres. Nineteen hundred, however, had been a poor year and the yield had only avraged 7.49 bushels to the acre. The growing season had been dry, and the arvest wet, but this year the crop ould not be better and the average yield would be very large. It was imssible to estimate the number oushels to the acre that would be harested, but the grain was heavy and lump throughout the district. and to the north was very fertile, but southward it was not quite so producive. In the whole of West Assiniboia last year the yield had been 32.93 bushels to the acre, so that it could be seen what the district could do even if it happened to be dry in the immediate vicinity of Moosomin.

Partridge Hill, Sept ,4, '01. Leaving Moosomin on Saturday, August 24th, through a thinly settled rolling country, covered chiefly with ow bushes and many waterholes and ponds, in all of which wild duck were seen in abundance, and the trip west

continued. At Broadview, a railway divisional point, situated at the head of West Lake, the passengers had a splendid supper. Wild duck was the chief point of the bill of fare. The duck season had just come in the day before, and the people living in the Northwest Territory nearly all had plenty lucks, as the sloughs all over are full of these wild water fowl.

After leaving Broadview, you can look out of the car window across the boundless prairie, covered with grass We reached Moosejaw shortly after

midnight and had to wait till 4,30 a.m., for the Limited. The station waiting room was crowded with harvesters but they were not lying around outside as at Winnipeg, Some were stretched in groups on the floor. One had crawled in below one of the benches, and was sleeping soundly, safe from being stepped on. Another was snoring loudly extended in serpentine form on one of the benches. The divisions in the seat accounted for his shape, and when he woke in the morning he would probably need ironing to take the semiircle sout of his form. He evidently

did not rest easily, for he muttered in his sleep, blank, blank, the stars are freezing to the moon." Others were sitting in the seats soundly asleep.
At last the Limited arrived and we boarded it. When one aroused to take interest in the landscape, it was Sunday morning, at 7.30, and the co without was exceedingly hilly. In the vicinity of Swift Current, the country s covered with ranches, We saw one man and two dogs guarding many hunireds of sheep, on a hillside. eached Medicine Hat about three in he afternoon. It is pleasantly situated at the foot of hills on the south branch of the Saskatchewan River. Here we saw the first Indians wrapped n blankets. They came down to rain selling horn ornaments. Mediine Hat is quite a town, in the heart of the ranching country. Coal is found near here in quantities, and natural gas has lately been secured.

The town has just carried a by-law, to aise money to light the town with this element of lumination.
At Medicine Hat, the level prairie s reacehd again with nothing but catle trails to show for what this country s utilized. The cattle trails cover the prairie like the threads of a spider's web. At places you notice huge fields fenced in. Allalong the line, the gates where fences there were-which was seldom,-had a high pole on either side with a wire strung across the top. I thought that the poles must be used to show the location of the gate, but later learned that this was a part of

some gate opening machinery. The fields were so large, however, I thought they needed something show where the gate was. Prairie fires had been raging along this part of the road, and we massed quite a few in full swing. It grew dark as we drew near Calgary, and as we had to leave in the morning for imonton, I saw but little of the

lace or its surroundings, but I liked Calgary is a pretty city, surrounded y hills, and on a clear day you can be the snow capped peaks of the Rockes. The buildings are nearly all of stone, and the town is fast building up.

I left Calgary with a determination From Calgary north for 40 miles, we w nothing but ranches, with hay stacks here and there, everywhere cat-Fifty tle, and cattle everywhere. Fifty miles north tilled farms began to ap-pear, and it was odd to see the grain here quite green, while when we reach ed Edmonton, 192 miles further north

we saw many farmers busy cutting their grain. The Western cattle are well ac quainted with the engineers on the train and run merrily in front of the locomotive, while the engineer toots the whistle. If cows are standing near the track, the train has to slow down, for the bovine always has to cross the track just in front of the engine. They are a good deal like women. don't know why the cows do this, but they do. The railroad has not yet reached Edmonton, but stops Strathcona, on the south bank of the Saskatchewan River. Here the banks are very high, and the situation of nton, reminds one of Ottawa, only the banks are of clay instead of only the banks are of clay instead of stone, as at the Capital City, but the banks here are just as high, if not higher. The bridge across the river has just been completed. The structure is an immense affair, and cost \$75,000, being paid for partly by the government and partly by the town of Edmonton.
