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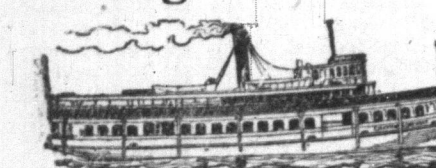
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Change of Time

A HOME WOMAN HAS SOMETHING TO SAY FOR WOMEN DOCTORS.

Dr. Stowe-Gullen's Rebuttal Her Prophecy and Its Realization—The Wider Sphere Does Not Render Woman Less Tender, Less Feminine—Toronto Woman Doctors Acquit Themselves Well—Work and Womanliness.

There was a time, not so long ago, when the woman doctor had not been heard of, nor dreamed of, in our fair land. There are those with strong enough prejudices to wish she had never been heard of, nor dreamed of, to this day. But she is here, and, to judge from the way she is progressing, she is here to stay. It is a good thing for the home woman to come in touch with her sisters of a wider, though not a higher, sphere. It teaches her lessons, helps to do away with her prejudices, and quickens her sympathy. Until I was a guest at the annual banquet of the Woman's Medical College of late, I had really no knowledge of what the pioneer in this profession was called on to pass through, or how man had impeded her way.

The woman doctor has had no royal road of learning. One easily gathered this from the experiences told. When Dr. Stowe-Gullen, whose long held sacred to the male persuasion! Not only would the whole system of education be upset, but the very foundation of social life jeopardized. It would never do, never do!

"Then," said the girl, "those people who sit in darkness are not so far astray when they destroy" all the girl babies. The custom might as well prevail in this land of boasted civilization, for if we are not allowed to grow to our full stature intellectually we have no business being alive. And remember this, the day is approaching when you will have to open your doors. Good-bye, was it? And prophetic as well. For exactly seven years later the doors of Toronto University opened to admit women.

It is to the honor of women doctors that they have acquitted themselves so well. At this annual banquet we who were among them, but not of them, could not but note that they were a body of workers, at once sincere, earnest and intelligent. These women, with strength and knowledge on their side, and the best of life before them, are bound to wield a potent influence. They are in love with their profession, not afraid of work, and there is no self behind the men doctors. They have come through the arduous years of preparation, the tax on brain and body, just as their big brothers have. The profession have come, and with more to their credit, since their big brothers never had confronting them, barring their way and hindering their progress, the accumulated prejudices of centuries.

She has her own life work to do, and if she be a true woman her aim is to do it thoroughly and well.

No fear of her being less tender, less feminine, because of her calling. Work never flied an atom of womanliness from anyone. It is the one who knows the most, and does the most, who is womanly to her finger-tips. She has learned the worth of a soul and realizes that humanity and divinity are near akin. When goodness and truth are hers they are hers for any walk of life. So, when objections are raised to our women doctors let it be on some other ground than the old worn one of the work unbecoming them. They have not lost either feminine virtues—or feminine failings—by the years of preparation and of practice. And

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THE YANADIS OF INDIA.

Some of the Peculiar Customs of This Queer Tribe.

In the Nellore district of the Madras presidency live the Yanadis, a strange tribe, as may be seen from a report which has been issued by the authorities of the Madras government museum. They live in forests and that they are little removed from savagery is indicated by the absence of implements or monumental material, the primitive hunting and fishing methods followed by many of the tribe and the habit of eating the almost raw flesh of the game they kill after slightly heating or scorching it. They are fearless in catching cobras, which they draw out of their holes without any fear of their fangs, and it is supposed that they protect themselves against the effects of snake bites by swallowing the poison sacs of the snakes. Especially singular is the manner in which they produce fire by friction. For this purpose they prepare two sticks, one short, the other long. In the former a square cavity is made, and it is held firmly in the ground while the long stick is twirled rapidly to and fro in the hole. Instead of charcoal powder they use rags or even dried leaves, which they find little difficulty in lighting.

The Origin of Many Names.

The popular terminations of pet names in earlier times were in, on, et, kin, cock and others. Emma was shortened to Em, and for love's sake it became Emmott or Emmet. Matilda was first Till, then Tillot. Bartholomew was Bart, then Little Bart or Bartlett. The popularity of these pet names is seen in the great number of them which eventually became family names.

The Tillotsons, the Emmetts and the Bartletts are numerous in England and America, although few dream that their names were originally pet and not surnames. Before the use of diminutive forms from the fact that the same name was not infrequently given to two or three children of the same family. The original of the surname Robinson is the pet name of Robin or Little Robert.

As Germans of today add then to children's names as a term of endearment, making Anna Ammen, Elizabeth Lischen, so our English ancestry used the equivalent kin. Watkin was Little Walter, Simkin Little Simon, Perkin Little Peter. Terminations in kin and cock were in use among the lower orders—that is, among the Anglo-Saxons—while the diminutives in, on and et were more aristocratic and used by families of Norman blood.
