ADDITION TO DERT

The revenue, expenditure and debt accounts for the fiscal year 1905-06 are not yet closed. Most of the revenue applicable to the year ending last June has been collected but many accounts are yet to be paid. The Canada Gazette gives the returns so far as they could be made

up at the end of July. During July \$1,001,225 was collected on the previous year's revenue, making a total of \$79,007,824 for the year. Last year the amount collected after July on account of the year before was \$253,565. If the same amount comes in this year the revenue for 19905-06 will be \$79,260,000. Mr. Fielding's budget estimate was \$79,000,000.

During July the sum of \$5,863,544 was expended on account of the past year, bringing the current expenditure up to \$59,924,869. This is still well short of Mr. Fielding's estimate of \$66,500,000. But the deferred payments made after July last year were \$7,299,357, and if the same amoun added this year the total will be \$67,224,205. Mr. Fielding expected to spend \$3,180,000 more in 1905-06 than in the previous year. But he is at present \$3,904,000 beyond that sum. This is current account.

The Finance Minister expected to spend \$15,500,000 on capital account, or the same as the previous year. He has spent down to the end of July \$13,797,293, and last year after July he paid \$3,510,000. The same payments this year will bring capital expenditure up to \$17,300,000. Mr. Fielding is now \$1,827,000 deeper than he was this time last year.

According to Mr. Fielding's budget figures the increase of net debt in the fiscal year, then nearly closed, would be \$800,000. But he said he was hopeful that the revenue would cover all expenditure so that nothing would be added to public debt. It is evident that this hope is vain. The net debt reported July 1st, 1906, was \$3,457,000 more than twelve months before. 
