"The attention of all owners of automobiles should be drawn to the new Government regulation regarding the numbers on their machines," commented Officer Tom Groves. "According to these new regulations all old numbers should be sent back to the department and large numbers will be returned to them. "No auto should be driven without either a number or a license either," continued Mr. Groves. "We have orders to stop all machines not bearing a number, and demand to see the license. If neither can be found the driver is liable to punishment. The other day I experienced a case of this kind. A man from West Lorne, A. McKillop, drove through the city without either a number or his license. He did not know he was liable under the law and of course I allowed him to proceed under the circumstances and did not detain him, taking his word that he had a license. However, we should not be placed in the position of having to take a man's word no matter how reputable a citizen he may be. "All autoists have received notices from the department and they should attend to them promptly."
