CALLER AWAY

The Late Henry Taylor Was Esteemed and Respected by Everyone Who Knew Him

There is probably no death which has occurred in Chatham in years which has caused more universal sorrow and regret than that of the late Henry J. F. Taylor, who passed away at his home on Queen street on Monday. He was a man who was very popular in Chatham and throughout Western Ontario, where he conducted business as a commercial traveller. There was probably no other man on the road who was so highly esteemed and respected by everyone. His death is the result of a long and serious illness. He was a great sufferer and underwent many serious and critical operations, but through it all he was ever cheerful and hopeful of his recovery. Some weeks ago it was thought he would recover his former health. He was able to leave his home and was well enough to take a short trip to Toronto, where he visited his firm, with whom he expected to resume his business relations. He suffered a relapse, however, and was again confined to his bed. The last illness proved too severe for his already weakened system and he was unable to withstand the severity of the renewed attack. The news of his death spread quickly over the city and everywhere it was received with regret and sadness.

Harry Taylor, as deceased was more popularly known by his friends, came to Chatham when he was a young boy and he has remained here ever since. He was born in Quebec on Dec. 4, 1848, the eldest son of the late Captain Taylor, who was a retired army officer. He came to Chatham with his father first to bothwell, when the latter was appointed manager of the bothwell property of the late Hon. George Brown. Harry, then a young boy, soon afterwards came to Chatham, where he received a position in George Ross' general provision store. He rose very rapidly in the world of commerce, being a bright and intelligent young man, and after also serving some time in Heyward's grocery he accepted a position as travelling representative for the Christie Brown Biscuit Company, of Toronto, which position he held up to the time of his death. He was in all employed by this company for about 21 years.

Deceased always took a lively interest in anything which pertained to the Maple City's good. He was for a number of years a member of the Excelsior Fire Department and later an enthusiastic member of the Veterans' Firemen's Association. He was a valued and respected member of the First Presbyterian church and for a number of years sang in the choir. During his early life he was a bass of considerable talent and much towards building up the musical portion of religious services in the First church. He was also a member of the Travellers' Association, the Sons of Scotland and the I. O. O. F.

In 1872 deceased was married to Miss Ellen McGee, daughter of the late William McGee, of Raleigh. Besides his widow one daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) James W. Rutherford, of this city, is left to mourn his loss. John Taylor, of Denver, Col., Judge Taylor, of White Horse, Yukon, Will Taylor, of Portland, Ore., are brothers, and Mrs. G. L. Bingham, of Idaho Springs, Col., and Mrs. Frank Rosebrough, of Bothwell, sisters of deceased.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 from his late residence, Queen street, to the Maple Leaf cemetery. The Veterans' Firemen will attend in a body.

Miss Hillman has prevailed upon Frank S. Welsman, of Toronto, to give another of his delightful piano recitals in this city on Friday, Dec. 1st, and he will be accompanied by W. Francis Firth, a baritone of high reputation. Those who attended his last recital will remember it with pleasure, and it is to be hoped they will attend and bring some of their friends.

The singing of "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow."
Since Mr. Kipp came to Chatham, a few months ago, he has made innumerable friends who all look up to him as a business man of more than ordinary ability and a jolly good fellow.

The toast to the host was responded to by Guy Davies, of Harrisburg, Judge Clark, of Towanda, Mr. Jennings, of West Virginia, E. B. McKee, of Towanda, editor of Towanda Daily News, and Reporter Journal, Dr. Johnson, Mr. P. E. T. Kizer, and Geo. Hill, of Towanda.

Other short speeches were given by E. Whelan, "the man who built the road," Mr. Babcock, W. N. Warburton, the general manager of the road.
All of the speakers expressed their delight with their visit to Chatham and the splendid electric road they found here. Some also spoke of the good relations existing between Canada and the United States. One speaker hoped that it would not be long before Canada and the United States would be one country and one people under one flag.

"I presume you mean this one," laughingly rejoined Tom Masterson, pointing to a large Union Jack.

The speech of the evening was given by Judge Clark. The judge is an orator of exceptional ability. "We are here," said he, "as good friends—people from two of the best governments on earth. I was very pleased to visit your thriving city, to see its fine stores, broad streets, good buildings, splendid farming district and your excellent climate, and the beauty and grace of your ladies, which is only equalled by the beauty and grace of the ladies of Towanda."

The judge went on to pay an eloquent tribute to Mr. Kipp and proposed unlimited prosperity for the new electric road. He closed with a touching reference to the late General Hill, who had planned to be present at the opening of the road.

The evening broke up shortly after midnight.

RIVAL CLAIMS TO TECUMSEH

Thamesville Citizens Also Press for Location of Proposed Monument

Mr. Bowyer's Position—Desires to See Kent United—Will Communicate with Chatham

Thamesville, Nov. 21.—A meeting of the citizens of Thamesville was held in the town hall to-night to make clear that Thamesville is the correct spot for the Tecumseh monument. Originally Thamesville was called Tecumseh. The battlefield of the Thames, where Tecumseh fell, is only three miles east of here. The spot where the battle took place is on the Longwoods road, which is the main road from London to Windsor, and many think the monument should be placed there.

The meeting was largely attended by the most influential citizens. D. A. Gordon, M. P., wired his regrets at being unable to be here, but assured the committee of his support. Thos. Bowyer, owner of the chair. Very interesting addresses were made by many citizens.

Chief Tobias and ex-Chief Albert Tobias, of Moraviantown Reserve, which is across the river opposite the battlefield, also put forth the plea: "A second monument should also be made which would be the restoration of the franchise to the Indians."

The following committee were elected to take steps to put Thamesville in first place: D. A. Gordon, M. P., P. H. Bowyer, M. P., P. P. Reeve, Dr. Fraser, Dr. Stewart, Dr. Beckett, D. W. Newcomb, G. A. Fraser, T. W. Sims, John Coates, Wm. Sherman, ex-Chief Albert Tobias, Chief Walter Tobias, H. A. French and S. P. Sturges, County Commissioner.

P. H. Bowyer, M. P., stated his position very frankly and squarely. He said that after Premier Whitney had intimated that the Tecumseh monument should be erected in Queen's Park, Toronto, the Chatham people and the people of Chatham had energetically put forth the Maple City's claims. Eager to see the monument secured for Kent County he had promised his support and intimated to the Premier the strength of his claims. Finding, however, that Thamesville had strong claims, he felt himself in duty bound to give his support to his own constituency in so far as his influence went.

Mr. Bowyer, however, greatly feared the rival claimants. In view of the Premier's position he was afraid that at that event, the monument would likely remain in Toronto. He would earnestly like to see the people of the County united on one side in Kent. He would at once communicate with the Chatham committee and he felt confident they would release him under the circumstances. He did not want to be on either side in question to ride two horses. At the same time he hoped the County could unite on one location and secure the monument.
