Organize Centreville Hotel Co., Ltd.

A second meeting of interested citizens was held in the Opera House on Friday evening, for the furtherance of the Centreville Hotel project, with a larger crowd in attendance than on the first occasion. E. L. West was elected chairman. The committee for the soliciting of share takers reported progress and introduced vouchers for shares pledged to the tune of \$2400 (240 shares), and this with very little effort. Those present beamed overjoyed to see the Hotel project so well out of its infancy. Provisional directors were elected in the persons of LeRoy G. Lee, G. E. Wilson, B. B. Estabrooke, B. E. Cliff, Da. F. M. Brown, J. Q. Stevens and L. H. Baldwin, and empowered to apply for a charter for the Centreville Hotel Co. Ltd. Several of the progressive and prominent farmers of the neighborhood and near localities are very much interested in Centreville's new work and two or three of them were glad to pool in the price of ten shares for her support. The management feels assured that the spirit of domestic improvement will be contagious, and that many of the other up to date agriculturists will be clamoring for a share of the interest and glory that will naturally accrue
