of the loyalists in St. John.

THE WORLD'S FAIR.—The World's Fair
has had little attraction so far for people in
this locality. Not a single ticket has been
sold here for the fair, and but two in An-
herst. A Toronto man who visited the
great exhibition told the Globe that the
buildings were incomplete and the exhibits
not all arranged.

THE TUNNEL SURVEY.—It is expected
that the survey for the proposed tunnel to the
lake will be continued about July 1st, and
of the 20 holes to be bored to complete the
survey, 10 are finished and as the machinery
is all on the ground it is expected that the
remaining 10 will be soon completed.

Mr. Palmer, E. E. will have no connection
with the work. Mr. Hendry, the govern-
ment engineer will superintend the work.
The \$12,000 appropriated, \$6000 have
already been expended and it is expected
the balance will complete the work.

FISH.—The catch of herring is reported

barrels of the fish.

Gasparian fishing has been moderately
good in the river during the past few weeks.

At the proper time the tide nearly all
the river banks are lined with fishermen,
with their long handled scoop nets and
some fine cat catches are reported.

The cold and backward weather of the
early spring has kept lobsters off shore and
so far the catches have been only fair.
The number of factories on the Straits will
be smaller than last year.

COMMISSION OF ENQUIRY.—It is expected
that a commission composed of several
Toronto gentlemen will be in Sackville this
week to take evidence in connection with
the suit of Nelson vs. City of Toronto, an
action to recover about \$50,000 for stone
alleged by the city architect to be below
contract quality. The stone was ordered
for the city buildings and some of it was
found inferior in quality and the city re-
fused to pay the work, and claims that be-
ter stone could have been secured for that
purpose. Mr. Bain, Geologist, of P. E.
Island, who made some analyses of the stone
will be one of the witnesses.

Atkinson accused two academy boys
who were sitting in the pew directly be-
hind his with being the cause of it. The
boys claim that Capt. Atkinson reproved
them in language such as the Post never
prints; this Capt. Atkinson de-
nies. The noise was over Capt. Frith
Atkinson took the matter in his own
hands and struck one of the supposed
offenders in the face, when a larger
student stepped up and took his col-
league's part. Several boys were ex-
changed before the contestants were
parted. Information against the two
supposed disturbers was laid before
Stipendiary Magistrate, and on Tuesday
morning the case was up for trial. The
court room was packed with students
and others. Mr. W. C. Milner repre-
sented the wardens and vestrymen of
St. Paul's and Mr. Powell, the students.
Just before the case was called to the
settlement was arrived at and the
charge was withdrawn, as it appeared
that the actual disturbers were others
than the accused. Mr. Powell in ad-
dressing the court stated that this was
a common case, that the three churches
in Sackville had suffered from noise and
disturbance on more than one occasion
and that the citizens were determined
to prevent its continuance. He cited
the law bearing on such cases and in-
dicated that his honor would be unlikely
to deal leniently with the offender against
public worship who appeared before
him.
