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

Mr. Allison had not been as strong as usual for the past two or three years, and on account of a weakness of the heart was compelled to give up active exercise. He has however attended regularly to his business until within the past two weeks a somewhat serious attack compelled him to remain at home, but he was at his office on Friday last for a short time. F. O. Allison was born in January 1850, the son of Edward Allison. While a young man he engaged in insurance business. From this Mr. Allison became a shipping clerk with the late Capt. Allan McLean, and when W. H. Purdy was made shipping master, Mr. Allison was deputy. He afterwards accepted the position of secretary of the Fernhill CemeterylCo., and in August 1897, was made secretary of the Board of Trade, which two positions he held until his death. In religious work he was much interested and had always taken a leading part. He was vestry clerk of St. John's (Stone) Church for a number of years. He married Miss Mary S. B. Kaye and leaves besides his wife, four children. One brother and several sisters survive, Dr. Lucius C. Allison of this city; Mrs. John Cudlip, Mrs. Abbot, wife of General Abbet, England; and Mrs. Retson, whose husband is a chaplain in the British Army.

CONCO FREE STATE.

The Stories of Brutality There Are Confirmed.

The Natives Cannot Get Redress for Wrongs.

Report Made by Rev. William Mor rison, a Returned Missionary.

London, May 7—Rev. William Morrison of Lexington, Virginia, a member of the American Presbyterian Missiop, who is here on his way home after six years' work along the Kassai River, about 300 miles in the interior of the Congo Free State, fully confirms the stories of the abuses in the Congo administration. He has furnished an exhaustive report on the situation to the Congo Free State authorities, to the American and British Ministers at Brussels and to Lord Lansdowne, detailing the results of his personal investigation, and showing that the situation is daily growing worse, as a result of the rubber monopoly's introduction of forced labor, virtually amounting to slavery. On his way to the coast the Rev. Mr. Morrisson covered 808 miles of the Kassai River, formerly chickly dotted with villages, and he says there are now less than a dozon villages there, the people having fled into the forests to escape the tyranny of the whites. The missionary declares it is impossible for the natives to get any redress from the Congo State officials for the flagrant abuses and cruetities to which they are subjected. Dr. Morrison sails for New York Monday, and will furnish the State Department at Washington with further evidence on the subject of Congo Free State alleged abuses.
