MARYSVILLE GETS GERMAN MORTAR

War Trophy Has Arrived But
No Place Prepared for It—
Suggestions Made

Marysville, N. B., Nov. 2.—Marysville has received its war trophy from the Militia Department. It is a German trench mortar which bears the marks of "trench warfare". It arrived a few days ago, consigned to the town clerk, and is at present stored in the C. N. R. freight shed, where it will possibly remain during the winter, as there has been no place prepared for it. While it is true that the trophy for the arrival of the war trophy was an uncertainty, it is also true that the citizens of Marysville during the year 1919 exhibited a keen interest in having a monument erected to the memory of our brave boys who made the supreme sacrifice, and a sum of money in the vicinity of \$500 was raised for that purpose, and is now in the hands of the local bank. The Canadian (Atlantic) Ltd., gladly offered the lot in the rear of the C.N.R. station to be made into a park where the monument might be erected. Further, the Hon. J. G. Dawson, vice president of the company, made the statement that he would like to see Marysville erect something creditable, and that when they decided on what they intended to do, to let him know, and that the company would meet the town half way, at least. Notwithstanding this magnificent offer, the summer of 1920 has passed away, and nothing at all has been done in regard to the monument and park. This must not be looked upon as an indication that the citizens of Marysville have forgotten the war and their dead heroes, but it is simply a case where it was everybody's business. It was nobody's business. It simply waited someone to take the initial step, and every citizen would have fallen into line and worked with a will.

It is true that the season for outdoor festivals is over for this year, but much might be done during the winter months in the way of concrete, dramatical entertainments, etc. We hope that some action will be taken in the matter by those in charge of civic affairs.

NOME IS ALMOST ABANDONED NOW

Mr. Meighen's Student Days

(Wanderer in Winnipeg Tribune.)
The Right Honourable Arthur Meighen, Premier of Canada, was in Room 15, at the University of Toronto, at the meeting of the Mathematical and Physics Society, in the fall of 1895. He was addressing the Society and among other things undertook to prove that this earth is a mere point. He argued that if you take an observation from any point on the earth to a fixed star, you get a certain bearing, and if you take a similar observation from a place on the opposite side of the earth to the same star, you get exactly the same bearing, showing that the distance between the two points on opposite sides of the earth is infinitesimal in comparison with the distance to the fixed star, or, in other words, the earth is a mere point in space.

I remember that on this first observation that I had on one who was himself to become a fixed star of Canadian politics, he made me feel exceedingly small. My regard for the great

ones of earth, notably our professors in mathematics at Varsity, also shrank terrifically. Later I have been reading of Premier Meighen's swing backward and forward across the continent in his private car. I have several times wondered whether he has changed his mind as to the size not only of this mundane sphere, but of the "Great Dominion".

During my college course I had an excellent opportunity of observing the future Premier of Canada at very close quarters. Arthur Meighen, "Bill" Martin (now Premier of Saskatchewan), and I used to eat at the same table at Powell's, on College street, just west of Spadina, then a fashionable resort for hungry but impetuous students. In those days that are no more we were able to buy a ticket, good for 21 meals, for the sum of \$2.50. One of the galling conditions, however, was the imposition, at least we so regarded it, of two cents extra payment if we wished to enjoy a second piece of pie or a second glass of milk

As we were strong on pie of any and every variety, we were mulcted into paying this super-tax daily. At dinner one day plum pie was on the bill of fare. We found it to be exceedingly stony, but, as usual, we called for the extra piece. I remember I paid a wager that I would get more stones in my two pieces of pie than they would find in theirs. I won the bet, for I extracted 46, while Meighen was a close second with 42. At that time the restaurateurs of Toronto grumbled about paying 25 cents for a five-pound pie of plum jam! This sounds like an apocryphal story, but it reflects an actual condition of affairs which prevailed when the National Policy was at the zenith of its power and was, even in those days, backed by Arthur Meighen in college debates.

In his university years, Meighen did much of his debating in the debating society which have assisted him so materially in public life. Although he was a mathematical, he always gave a good account of himself in debates at a black and white sketch of Meighen, with coat tails flying, rushing hot-foot after the retreating train and stretching out his hand for the brass handles of the last coach. He caught the

train all right, and it was lucky for him that he did, for he was due that day in Toronto to write on the final examination for his B. A. degree.

Many years later I used to see Meighen frequently when he was studying law in Winnipeg, and we often talked about the old days in Toronto. It is easy to prophesy after the event, but when I found that Meighen had forsaken high school teaching for law, I felt sure that he would debate his way up the ladder of preferment in the political world, and would one day become a leader in national affairs. He has now reached the summit of his ambition, and I have been assured by those who know that he has risen to his present place of power and distinction because of his outstanding ability as a speaker and especially his skill as a debater. He has not won, though, without incessant and arduous toil. Friends of mine in Ottawa used to tell me years ago that if they wished to find Meighen when the House was not in session they always knew where to go. He was sure to be in the library, deep in the study of the tariff versus free trade, or some kindred subject.

Meighen has also been a wide reader. Going east from Winnipeg to Toronto a couple of years ago, I was glad to find him in the same Pullman as myself. The next day I missed him, and discovered him at last in one of the day coaches. He had left his acquaintances of the Pullman and had gone back in order to pursue an interrupted reading of the sort of book that your ordinary politician could not be hired to study. "The Life of George Canning," the brilliant follower of William Pitt, and one of the greatest British statesmen in a period almost as troublous as our own.

This story goes to prove that if Arthur Meighen has risen to the Premiership of this Dominion, he has done so by bending every energy to prepare himself for the responsibilities of that high office. I must confess that I cannot subscribe all my friend's political doctrines, in fact, I violently dissent from some of his views, but even his political foes must agree with me when I say that he is to be admired for his capacity for hard work and for the courage and ability with which at all times and every

where, east and west, he nails his colors to the mast.

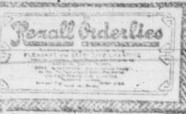
