It must be held thus, without lessening the pressure fo ra moment, until a physician arrives.

If the cut is in a position where the handkerchief cannot be used, press the thumb down between the wound and the heart, and keep it there.

Remember that the blood flows from the heart out to the wound, and pressure beyond that point will be entirely useless.

In the case of veins, the flow of blood is in the opposite direction, and can only be stopped by pressure below the wound.
