The "Thirty Pieces of Silver." The piece of silver, thirty of which were paid to Judas in his trade of betraying Christ, was of peculiar interest to the Israelites, and was always spoken of in their holy books as the shekel of Israel, or holy shekel of the sanctuary. It was the amount which each Israelite between the ages of twenty and fifty was required to pay into the public treasury as a ransom for their delivery during their sojourn in the wilderness.

According to British currency, a shekel was worth 2 shillings 3 pence 3 farthings, or about 50 cents in United States coin. Money was, however, much more valuable at that time, and the "thirty pieces" were equal, at that day, to about \$3,000 to-day. The shekel was somewhat larger than a half dollar, and was smoothed edge. On one side it bore the emblem of Aaron's rod, as mentioned in Numbers, xvii, 8, surrounded with the inscription in Hebrew which is given in the eleventh chapter of Leviticus with the words, "Shekel of Israel." Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-empt may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
