The "Thirty Pieces of Silver." The piece of silver," thirty of which were paid to Judas in his trade of bewere paid to Judas in his trade of fe-traying Christ, was of peculiar interest, to the Israelites, and was always spok-en of in their holy books as the shekel of Israel, or holy shekel of the sunc-tuary. It was the amount which cach Israelite between the ages of wenty and fifty was required to pay into the public treasury as a ransom for their de-livery during their sojourn in the wilder-ness.

According to British currency, a shekel was worth 2 shillings 3 peuce 3
farthings, or about 50 cents in United
States coin. Money was, however, much
more valuable at that time, and the
"thirty pieces" were equal, at that day,
to about \$3,000 to-day. The shekel was
somewhat larger than a half dollar, and
was smoothed edged. On one side it bore
the emblem of Aaron's rod, as mentioned in Numbers, xvii. 8, surrounded with
the inscription in Hebrew which is given
in the eleventh chapter of Leviticus—
with the words, "Shekel of Israel."—
