FIVE WEEKS WITH THE FRUIT GROWERS

A. G. Turney, Provincial Horticulturist, returned ten days ago from a five weeks tour among the illustration orchards and fruit growers. The Government orchards at Andover, Stanley, Doaktown, Chatham, Tetagouche, Balmoral and Buctouche were visited and a number of trees replaced. New illustration orchards were set at Little Shemogue, Westmorland Co. and Plaster Rock. All the illustration orchards have been pruned with the exception of those at New Brandon, Kingston and Upper Queensbury. Five hundred trees were planted and pruned on the farm of Philibert Depres, Cormierville, Kent Co. Five hundred trees belonging to Stanislas Cormier, at Aboujajane, Westmorland County, were pruned and assistance in planting and pruning private orchards given in the counties of Kings, Victoria and Carleton. The trees are in bloom exceptionally early this year and in some localities slight damage from frost is reported. As an instance of the early season the eggs of the tent caterpillar were reported hatched April 27th. The insect and the larva of the bud moth are increasing steadily from year to year and spraying will have to be more generally adopted if their ravages are to be checked.
