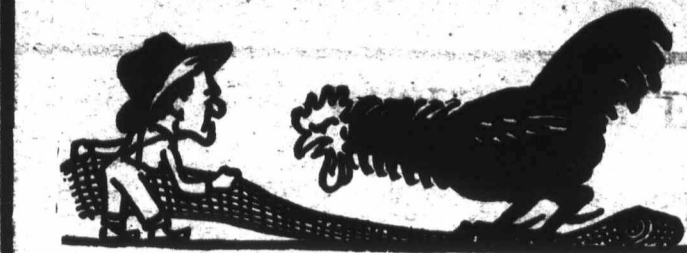
SUCCESSFUL DANCE

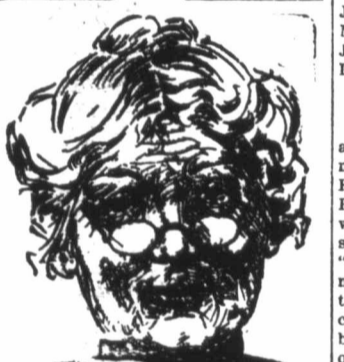
