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ECONOMY IN A FAMILY. There is nothing a good writer, which goes so far to reward plunging young people beyond the reach of poverty, as economy in the management of their domestic affairs. A man, I assure you, who is a miser, is no true friend to his family. If there is a couple who are in the habit of saving, and leakage in his kitchen or in the parlour runs away with the money, he is not a miser, he is a fool. He is not a miser, who cries "More! like the horse-leech's daughter, until he that provided him no more to give." It is the husband's duty to bring his wife to see that none goes wrong out of it.

A man gets a wife to look after his house, to assist him in his journey through life, and not to dissipate property. The husband's interest should be the wife's care, and her greatest ambition carry her to the same end. He should be as careful also with that of her children. ARRIVAL OF THE ASDAB.
NEW YORK, June 16th.
The *Asdab* arrived at night with a cargo from Liverpool to the 4th. Breadstuffs, 1000 bushels; Wheat 2000 bushels; Flour advanced 10 on the week; Agricultural speculative and consumptive demand; Western Canada 23s 6d.; Wheat, white, 7s. 10d. to 7s 4d; red and mixed 6s 9d to 7s. 10d. unchanged. Beef firm. Pork unchanged. Bacon unchanged. Lard 15d to 16d. Tallow quiet. Ashes unchanged, little demand.

The English mail arrived last evening and we have details of news by the *Asdab*. The Turkish question is still undecided. There was a royal order from the Sultan, Nesselrode had been sent to Constantinople and an amicable arrangement was expected in consequence. The rumour proved correct and all is doubt again, the market rising and falling with every new tale. Russia has demanded from the Venetians the payment of an old loan of 50,000,000 francs, or the cession of the territory of Astrabad on the shore of the Caspian.

Quebec, June 13.

Yesterday His Excellency was pleased to sanction the following bills:

An Act to enlarge the Representation of the people of Canada, in Parliament.

To incorporate the *Institute Co-operative*.

To empower the directors of the Grand River Navigation Company to place said Navigation Company under the control and management of the Province Government, with certain conditions.

To amend the law relative to Gram Schools in Upper Canada.

To facilitate the performance of the duties of Justices of the peace out of session, in Upper Canada, with respect to persons charged with indictable offences.

To protect Justices of the peace in Upper Canada, from vexatious actions.

To amend an Act relating to the Provincial Insurance Company.

To incorporate the Registry Laws of Kentville Railway.

To amend the Registry Laws of Upper Canada.

To authorize Montreal and New York Railroad Co. to extend their road and facilities for the same.

To amend the Act incorporating the Upper Canada Mining Company.

The petition of H. Taylor, Toronto, referred to the Library Committee.

The house concurred in the report of the committee on the address of the Hon. the Minister of the Interior, Hon. J. A. A. McCreary, Ontario, Canada East, and Hon. J. A. A. McCreary, Ontario, Canada West, by the latter bill to amend the Act.

The report of the committee of the whole house on the law relative to the sole nuptial marriages was concurred in.

The following bills were read a first time, and the house devoted to the matter of making searches in Registry Offices, Lower Canada. To provide for military and naval returns to government, and to provide for the more efficient management of the business of the Superior Courts, and amend Municipal Act of Upper Canada.

To consolidate the law relating to the jurisdiction of the courts of the province, and to amend the Act for the purpose of Jurors. To continue certain exp. laws.

QUEBEC, June 11th.—Last night on the third reading of Marriage Bill, Mr. Brown moved in amendment that the bill be recommitted to a committee of the whole House to provide that the clergymen of the Established Church of England and Scotland, and of the "Church of Rome, shall come under the operation of the said bill in the same manner as the Clergy of other denominations notwithstanding any imperial Act, or any usage of the country.
