AMERICAN FISHERMAN GOES TO THE HAGUE.

GLOUCESTER, June 24.—Eminent lawyers and all the Commissioners representing the United States before the Hague Tribunal which is arbitrating the Newfoundland Fisheries Question, are handicapped by the lack of a practical fisherman to present the fisherman's case. Their need communicated to the State Department at Washington is responsible for the appointment of Capt. C. Young who has sailed out of Gloucester for more than a score of years. Capt. Young will start for the Hague immediately.

THIRTY-SEVEN PERSONS KILLED.

MEXICO CITY, June 24.—Thirty-seven persons were killed and many others injured yesterday in a wreck of a troop train trolley car on the National Railways. Four cars of the train broke loose and dashed down a steep grade, jumping the track at terrific speed. There were about 150 persons in the four cars. Many jumped before the cars gained headway and thus saved their lives. The dead include a number of soldiers, 5 officers and members of their families. The engineer and conductor were arrested by the authorities and are now in jail pending an investigation.

THE KIEL REGATTA.

KIEL, June 24.—In the feature event of the Regatta to-day the American schooner yacht "Westward," owned by Mr. Cochran, of New York, won the Krupp Memorial Prize, beating Emperor William's Meteor, with the Emperor himself by half an hour over a 23 mile course. The Hamburg was third. The Germans did not finish. The "Westward" was sailed by Captain Barr, the American

skipper and an expert crew. She outlasted the others leading from start to finish. The race was sailed in a perfect calm, and there was a heavy rain throughout. Emperor William personally steered the Meteor during 9 hours it took to complete the race.

Stationery Grafting.

OTTAWA, June 24.—A system of grafting at the Government printing bureau is creating a profound sensation. The State Department to-day issued the following statement:—"One fugitive from justice, three officials dismissed, four employees dismissed, one official suspended." This is the result of the investigation which has been carried on by Hon. Charles Murphy, Secretary of State, and which is now drawn to a close. F. S. Goldthorpe, who for twenty years has been Superintendent of Stationery, is wanted by the Dominion police. He has not been in the city for several days and is believed to be in the country. The frauds so far discovered mainly concern the Stationery Department which he had charge of, and the purchase of all paper and stationery was therefore under his direct supervision. The purchases totalled hundreds of dollars a year.

Trainmen May Strike.

MONTREAL, June 24.—A critical stage has been reached in the negotiations between the Canadian Pacific trainmen and the Company regarding the demand of the former for increased pay. What practically amounted to ultimatums were issued to-day by either side, and unless one or the other recedes from their present position, there is every indication that they will come to grips. In a very few days, the Company takes the stand that it has accepted the finding of the Board of Conciliation and will stand by it. The men will not accept the decision, but demand the adoption by the Company of the standard rate of pay for the territory or group of railways in which the C. P. R. and G. T. R. are included, and say if the Company will not grant this they are prepared to fight at a very short notice.

Death of Mr. C. Trippe at New York.

Mr. C. Trippe, Superintendent of the Anglo-American Telegraph Co. in New York, died at Brooklyn last Thursday week. Mr. Trippe is well known here, particularly in Heart's Content, where at first he worked. He was then removed to the office at St. Pierre, and afterwards brought back to Heart's Content as Superintendent. He was then put in charge of the New York office. He earned the respect of Americans as a "splendid specimen of a disappearing type, the old English gentleman in business." He leaves a daughter in St. John's, Mrs. David Markin, wife of one of the Commercial Cable Staff.

The N. Y. Times says of him:—"Correspondents of London newspapers in this city were surprised and shocked yesterday to read of Mr. Trippe's death. He was at his office seemingly as robust as ever, only a few days ago, and had a long talk with a London journalist, telling of his last visit to Europe and of how he had looked up some relatives in Switzerland."

"I may never have the chance to see him again," Mr. Trippe said, "for I am getting to be an old man." Nobody has ever been more helpful to London correspondents in New York than Mr. Trippe. Everything he could do for them he did, willingly and cheerfully. It did not matter if many words or few were to be telegraphed. If by putting in a special wire or sending an expert operator he could help the quick dispatch of an important message he would do it, whatever trouble it cost him. And he had a delightful old English way of doing things. There was none of the rush in that little private office of his in Broad street which one usually finds in the office of a manager of a big concern. In his efforts to help the patrons of his company he did things which are now often considered quack out of date, but which were charming.

A Strange Plant.

The Drinking Orchid and its Fruitless Search for Water.

"The strangest orchid I ever saw," said a naturalist, "lives on the edge of a lagoon on the Rio de la Platte—live! I say, for surely no animal is more alive than they, and among them I first realized the pathos of its roots that bind it forever to one spot. These orchids had each at the center or axis a long stem a half inch wide and a quarter inch thick. They grew on dead limbs overhanging the lagoon, and now and then when in need of water they uncoiled their axillary stems, lowered them three or four feet to the stream and when enough water had been drunk coiled the stems up again as a tape measure coils up on its spool."

"A strange sight that still and tropical afternoon—a silent, sun-drenched lagoon, a scarlet blaze of orchids and here and there those slim, supple tubes descending to drink, satisfying themselves, then coiling up again."

"But what impressed me most was a mass of faded orchids that continually and restlessly let down their tubes in vain, for the stream had fallen, and hence the tubes descended on dry ground. It was pitiful. The orchids were dying, but with what strength was left to them they lowered and drew up their tubes. They felt feverishly and weakly for the water that wasn't there."

"A sad sight—a sight that brought home the pathos of the immobility of plants."—Exchange.

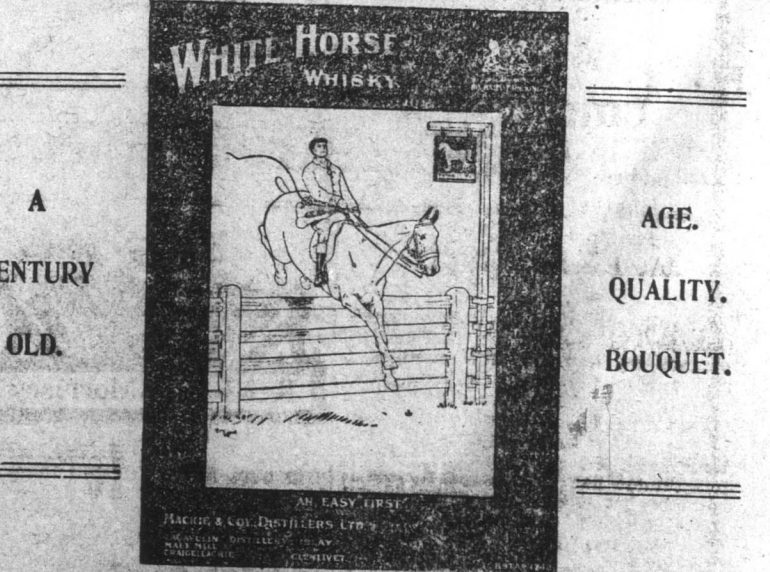
"Reform's" Last Word Before the Election.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—Just one word before the poll is taken and the men who are to manage our civic affairs during the next four years are chosen. I am fully aware that the letters on Municipal Reform which you have been good enough to accept from me have exerted very little influence upon the mind of the public, nor did I ever expect that they would have much effect. The circumstances of the case forbade any such hope. These are not the days when whole communities can be aroused from apathy to energy by the clarion tones of one single voice, nor is mine a voice which could ever or under any conditions produce so tremendous an effect. Nor have I an ambition to be a Vox Clamantis. I would fain be that "still small voice" which could nevertheless awaken some sleeping consciences to a sense of civic duty. Hitherto I have not been very successful even in that humble effort, but I do not despair. Where I have failed others better qualified may, and I trust will, succeed. I confess that I had some faint hope that I might have provoked at least one of the twelve candidates for Municipal honours to pledge himself against expenditures upon fads and frills until the city was cleansed and made a decent habitation for its citizens. I had hoped that at least one of these gentlemen would have pronounced against the completion of the Wind-sor Lake folly and against the erection of Municipal offices until the sewers and drains were purified. I would not be misunderstood. I am no enemy to liberal and enlightened expenditure, nor do I think that it lies beyond the jurisdiction of Municipal bodies to supply the population with every means of innocent pleasure. My protest, however, is strongly raised against any and every expenditure on such purposes so long as the city remains dirty and unwholesome and its death-rate higher than its situation and facilities for sanitation warrant. I plead for an honest recognition of our pressing wants and an honest endeavour to supply them. I raise my voice against the death rate, against the sacrifice of life and health in order to provide the thoughtless with stupid recreation. We are poor and we should learn to eschew want or extravagance. Let us be decent before we begin to put on frills. Let us be practical before we try experiments. Let us learn our own duty before we expect our rulers to perform theirs. We have our chance now; it has come at the eleventh hour, and it has not come.
