Judgment in Condon vs. Council

At noon to-day in the magistrate's Court Judge Kinght handed down the written judgment of Judge Conroy in the case of John K. Condon versus the Municipal Council.

The judgment was in favour of the plaintiff for \$145.00, the full amount claimed being \$200. This was an action taken by Condon to recover damages on account of injuries to his property and loss and inconvenience suffered by himself and family. The facts briefly are:-

In October, 1907, the plaintiff had a sewer laid down from his house or Pennywell Road and connecting with the main sewer, the work being under the supervision of a Council official. During the first rain storm following the construction of the sewer the plaintiff's house became flooded. Those floods continued periodically for five years and were caused by a fractured pipe as a result of negligence on the part of Council employees.
