Judge Bucknill Quits.

Celebrated English Jurist Retires From the Bench-Sporting Justice, Who was Described as the Most Popular Man at the British Bar, Has Been Equally Well Liked in the Judiciary and is the Hero of Many a Funny Story-A Born Poacher.

In the retirement through illhealth, of Mr. Justice Bucknill, the English Bench loses one of its most has discharged his duties with zeal. and ability, and who has won the respect of everyone who appeared before him. He has always been what is known as a lenient criminal judge. his sentences never erring on the only has an appeal from him to the Court of Criminal Appeal succeeded. and that resulted merely in a slight reduction of sentence. Sir Thomas Bucknill, who is 69, has been a judge of the King's Bench Division of the

High Court of Justice since 1899. "If I were asked to decide who is the most popular man at the Bar," the late Sir Frank Lockwood once said, "I should say Tommy Bucknill. This popularity he maintained to the full on the Bench, as, indeed, in ev-Thomas Bucknill has been a thorough sportsman; not even the late Mr. Justice Grantham had better claim to be called a "sporting judge."

For many years he was a well-

known figure on many race-courses. and none was more familiar at the Bar Point-to-Point Steeplechases. Yet with all his devotion to the sport he himself has declared that he never made a bet. Fishing, among other sports, he was also keen on, and he recently described himself as a born poacher. Once in Wales he showed a friend how to "tickle" trout.
