Vanderbilt Gave Woman His Lief-Belt and Died.

London, May 10 .- Two survivors of he Lusitania disaster have given testimony that Alfred G. Vanderbilt died heroically; that he went to death to save the life of a woman.

Thomas Slidel, a friend of Mr Vanderbilt, who lives at the Knicker bocker Club at New York, and was ravelling with him, told of the sacrifice. To-night Norman Ratcliffe who lives in Gillingham, Kent, and was returning from Japan, offered verification. Mr. Ratcliffe was res cued after clinging to a box in the sea for three hours. With him was

a steward of the Lusitania.

WAS SEEN NO MORE. "This steward," Mr. Ratcliffe said told me he had seen Mr. Vanderbild on the Lusitania's deck shortly after the ship was struck, with a life belt around his body.
