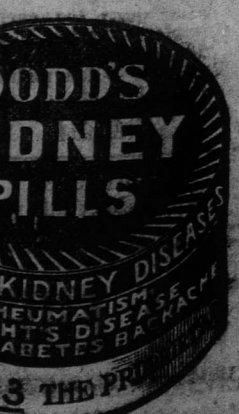

Lord Roseberry and the Judas Kisses.

Lord Roseberry, speaking in Edin-
burgh of the surprises of the war,
said:

"We could not conceive it possible
that a great civilized country, which
believed itself to stand at the head of
the culture of the world, which had
achieved a prosperity beyond all hu-
man experience, swelling in forty
years from forty millions of popula-
tion to nearly seventy millions, having
made a commerce unexampled in the
history of the world, having potent
armies and potent fleets for its de-
fense—we said we could not have be-
lieved it possible that this nation was
all the time, with genial smiles and
Judas kisses, its chief visiting Eng-
land amidst the acclamation of the
simple-hearted people attended by the
chief of his detectives as spies, by a
deliberate and infamous conspiracy
against the liberties of the world, was
plotting a war of which no human
being at this moment can see the
limits, but which every child can see
trans the ruin and devastation of
Europe.

"All this in the lust of some vile
idea of conquest which, God help us,
shall never be fulfilled." (Prolonged
cheers.)

Luxury in the Bastille.

The Famous French Prison During
the Reign of Louis XIII.

It was during the reign of Louis
XIII. that the Bastille became recog-
nized as a prison, especially for no-
table persons suspected of treachery
against the French government. Riche-
lieu used it for the secure lodgment
of troublesome opponents, and during
his time the celebrated fortress be-
came the luxurious prison of a pow-
erful aristocracy.

Apart from the necessary restric-
tions, a stay in the famous prison of
Paris was little more than an agree-
able diversion. It seemed indeed as
though the king was determined to
show his kindness. He expressed
great anxiety for the comfort of his
prisoners.

Money could buy in the Bastille all
the luxury that could be obtained out-
side, and should a poor man stray
within the impenetrable walls the king
was so eager to prove his hospitality
that he at once allowed him a reason-
able pension. The rooms in which the
prisoners were confined were lofty
and well aired; the furniture was ar-
ranged according to the taste of the
occupant.

Mme. de Staël, for instance, hung
her walls with rich tapestries, and
many a distinguished culprit carried
with him to the Faubourg St. Antoine
his family portraits or a valuable
library.

Nor is it in the least significant that
the prison barber visited his patrons
every morning with a silver basin,
perfumed soap and embroidered tow-
els. The best viands, well cooked,
were furnished to the better class of
prisoners, and at the close of the
meals they exchanged visits, played
cards and made the walls of the
gloomy looking prison ring with their
merriment.

Verdun.

The attention of the world, during
the past week, has been centred on the
mighty struggle which has raged
round this ancient fortress city. It
is situated on the river Meuse, 130
miles east north east of Paris. It is
a city of considerable importance as
a trade centre and as the principal
fortress of eastern France.

It was a town of some importance in
the times of the Romans. Here in
843 a treaty was entered into by
which Charlemagne's Frankish em-
pire was divided into three king-
doms, the Verdunois territory, going
to the Dukes of Lorraine. Baldwin,
the brother of Godfrey of Bouillon,
sold it to the Bishop of Verdun, who
gave it in fief for some time as a vis-
county to the count of Moncon and
Bar. Verdun early became a free-im-
perial city of the German empire, but
the bishop claimed absolute author-
ity, and the numerous conflicts re-
sulted in 1552 in the city coming un-
der French domination, which was
sanctioned by the Westphalian treaty.
Two royalists surrendered the town
to the Prussians, in 1792, in conse-
quence of which the commander of the
citadel (Beauregard) shot himself,
and subsequently many of the loyal-
ists were executed by the republican
authorities. It will be noted that the
Germans are well acquainted with
Verdun, because in the Franco-Prus-
sian war of 1870 it surrendered on
Nov. 8th, after a siege of about a
month. Many officers and much ar-
tillery and war material fell into the
hands of the Germans. It was occu-
pied by them as a pledge until the
final payment of the war indemnity in
1873. So there can be no doubt that
they are intimately acquainted with
all its surroundings and facilities for
approach and attack. It has been
greatly strengthened by the French
since that time.
